

Stop Work Order extended in Tallaganda State Forest

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) has extended a Stop Work Order applying to parts of Tallaganda State Forest, near Braidwood.

The extension of the Stop Work Order was required because Forestry Corporation NSW (FCNSW) is yet to advise the EPA that it has undertaken the necessary surveys to identify and protect Southern Greater Glider den trees. The NSW EPA is continuing to engage with FCNSW.

The Stop Work Order was first issued to FCNSW by the EPA on 30 August 2023. Since then, the EPA has recorded 89 endangered Southern Greater Gliders and 20 den trees in areas subject to the Stop Work Order. Those areas had been earmarked for harvesting or planned harvesting operations.

Under the Coastal Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (CIFOA), FCNSW is required to plan, implement and conduct forestry operations in a competent manner. Once identified, FCNSW is required to protect den trees and implement 50 metre exclusion zones around them.

Den trees and their surrounding habitat are critical for Southern Greater Gliders feeding and movement. Removal of habitat removes shelter and food, making the gliders vulnerable to harm.

The EPA is also continuing its investigation into other alleged breaches detected in Tallaganda State Forest. These investigations include a range of alleged non-compliances with the CIFOA such as alleged damage to habitat of threatened species and/or ecological communities, alleged damage to environmentally sensitive areas and alleged failure to retain trees in accordance with the CIFOA.

Forestry Corporation trials new methods for identifying Greater Glider dens

Forestry Corporation of NSW is trialling new ways of searching for Greater Glider dens in the wake of proposed introduction of survey requirements for this species tabled by the Environment Protection Authority.

The ruleset governing native forestry in NSW, the Coastal Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (CIFOA) outlines the protections for threatened species at a landscape level. These have been implemented for the past 5 years without any concerns being raised. However, in recent months Forestry Corporation has received stop work orders in two south coast forests related to searching for Greater Glider dens.

General Manager Hardwood Forests, Daniel Tuan, said that since the EPA raised concerns in Tallaganda State Forest in August this year, Forestry Corporation had been working with the EPA to understand the new desired survey requirements for dens and trialling new methods to achieve this.

"In the past we used spotlight transect sample surveys to search for Greater Gliders themselves to understand the density of glider populations in forests. These were conducted in the hours after sunset along tracks and trails to ensure it was safe for the people walking in the bush after dark and dens were seldom sighted.

"It was thought that thermal UAVs might offer a better alternative to finding dens so we have been trialling different technologies and methods in these two forests."

Across Tallaganda and Flat Rock State Forests eight nights of targeted Greater Glider surveys have been undertaken involving over 30 UAV flights.

The UAV flights must meet CASA regulations and require pilots to be CASA certified and qualified to fly drones with 'extended visual line of sight' and 'night operations'.

"This is a brand new proposed survey approach so we are trialling everything from the type of UAV fitted with equipment like thermal imaging cameras and spotlights, the duration of the flight, the speed, height, intensity of sampling and data recording requirements," Mr Tuan said.

"All of this has to be done when it is relatively cool to allow for thermal cameras to detect animals, so the survey flights are being conducted either late at night or very early morning. The efficacy of these surveys and the different equipment and techniques is simply not known at this stage.

"In Tallaganda we already knew Greater Gliders were present as we have been undertaking a monitoring program there for several years which has detected hundreds of records. In these latest trials with UAVs we found over 80 individual Greater Gliders but the technology did not allow us to identify any dens. In Flat Rock, which is a coastal forest less suitable for Greater Gliders, we found 2 individual Greater Gliders but again no dens."

The UAV surveys have been conducted using a combination of new UAVs purchased by Forestry Corporation and a number of expert UAV specialist companies who have extensive experience in land and forest management applications.

"We have more trials planned across a series of other forests over the next month to see if we can find a method that can reliably identify dens across the landscape," Mr Tuan said. "Protecting the habitat of threatened species is always a priority for us and something that the CIFOA ruleset is predicated on."

"With the trials of UAVs are proving challenging, we have also proposed alternate precautionary measures to the EPA across a broad range of forests we know Gliders use to augment the protections that are already in the ruleset."

Under the existing CIFOA ruleset, planning for harvesting operations in these two forests included over 300 kilometres of detailed habitat assessment traverse with over 6000 hollow bearing trees and over 2000 giant trees marked for protection. Hollow bearing trees will often be used as dens for arboreal mammals and birds, but can only be recorded as a 'den' when an animal is seen entering or emerging from the hollow.

"We are committed to protecting Greater Gliders and other threatened species and have also proposed alternate precautionary measures across a broad range of forests we know Gliders use to augment the protections that are already in the ruleset."

Changed traffic conditions will be in place on the Kings Highway at Misty Mountain

Changed traffic conditions will be in place on the Kings Highway at Misty Mountain from Friday while construction of the new eastbound overtaking lane is closed down for the Christmas break.

The project site will close between Friday 22 December 2023 and Monday 8 January 2024, weather permitting.

During this time, stop/slow traffic conditions will be removed, and one lane will be open in both directions to ensure safe and efficient travel for motorists throughout this busy holiday period.

The reduced speed limit of 60 km/h will remain in place for the safety of motorists.

Transport for NSW is continuing to deliver a program of safety and efficiency upgrades on the Kings Highway to keep the community safe and freight moving between Batemans Bay and the NSW/ACT border.

Improvement work on the way for Yass, Bungendore and Ellerton roads intersection - Queanbeyan

Motorists and pedestrians will soon experience a safer journey in Queanbeyan, with improvement work set to start at the roundabout intersection of Yass Road, Bungendore Road and Ellerton Drive.

Steve Whan, the local Member for Monaro and Minister for Skills, TAFE and Tertiary Education, said work to improve pedestrian safety and traffic efficiency at the intersection of the three roads would be carried out early in the new year.

"A pedestrian refuge will be installed on Bungendore Road and a two-lane approach to the roundabout from Ellerton Drive will also be built," Mr Whan said.

Thanks to the government's new Regional Roads Fund, \$19 million has been earmarked for a future major upgrade of the intersection of Yass, Bungendore and Ellerton roads. Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Jenny Aitchison said the short-term improvement would make the intersection safer now and allow for its transformation to a signalised intersection in the future.

"New traffic lights are planned for the long-term and they will improve safety and efficiency for all road users," Minister Aitchison said. "The community will be kept informed as the project progresses."



Ms Mosely said "It was a fun filled day. The staff at the Batemans Bay Aquatic Centre also commented on the exceptional behaviour of our students."



Festival of Small Halls Tour Returns

Woodfordia Inc. in partnership with Goulburn Mulwaree Council will present the Festival of Small Halls Summer Tour 2024, at St. Saviour's Cathedral Hall on Friday 12 January 2024 from 6.30pm.

Focusing on traditional Scottish music, Ryan Young brings new life to very old, often forgotten tunes by playing them in his own unique way. His fiddle playing is brimming with fresh melodic ideas, an uplifting rhythmic drive, and a great depth of dynamics and precision.

New agreement with ANU to support community music and arts programs

The ACT Government will provide ongoing funding to the ANU School of Music and ANU School of Art and Design for community outreach activities.

More than \$2 million will be provided to both schools over the next three years to support a broad range of music and visual arts programs and enable members of the community to access music and visual arts programs, develop their artistic skills and enable artists to develop and increase their capacity and capability. The new School of Music program has been rebranded as the ANU Community Music Centre and reflects a shift towards fostering community and inclusive music-making. It will provide more opportunities for adults, women, gender diverse individuals and other minority groups, and increase the visibility of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander music and musicians.

There is increased focus on accessibility for ACT communities that don't have access to opportunities to create and make music, recognising that music is not age or time limited, nor should it be restricted or prohibited by background or experience.

The School of Art and Design will continue to offer programs that address barriers across key diversity areas through two public outreach programs – Sharing Stories Arts Exchange and the new Living City: People, Plants and Places program.

Minister for the Arts, Culture and the Creative Economy Tara Cheyne said the ongoing funding would help increase participation in the arts.

"These programs provide access to high quality, inclusive arts programs that develop the artistic skills of participants including from diverse backgrounds and those who may experience barriers to getting involved in arts programs for a range of reasons.

"They strongly align with our Arts, Culture and Creative Policy, helping to increase the visibility of the arts in Canberra, and increasing opportunities for our artists, arts workers and arts organisations.

"The ANU Community Music Centre offers an incredible range of programs, including its Community Rock School that gives anyone the opportunity to rehearse and perform in a contemporary band setting.

"The Sharing Stories Art Exchange offers the creative community first-hand experience on Country, learning about cultural practices and developing relationships. It is reconciliation in action.

"Living City: People, Plants and Places is a new program that will encourage accessible and inclusive art-based engagement with urban spaces while addressing climate change, urban biodiversity, wellbeing and conservation.

"I'm proud to see our long-standing relationship with the ANU School of Music and ANU School of Art and Design continuing through this agreement," said Minister Cheyne.

Tis the season

Oddly, it's the nature of the Christmas story that ought to constantly reform the church, keeping in check its inclination to greatness, empire and dominance. I have friends touring Europe right now that daily send me photos of the most mind-blowing cathedrals. What exactly do these magnificent buildings mean? My hunch, nothing more, is that they appear to be museums; tourist attractions. There is aesthetic beauty and it is marvellous to ponder that once there was a culture that were content to take 600 years to get their building complete. Imagine any government proposing a project to be completed 600 years from now. Does anyone even think in such grand proportions? I guess there was a time before efficiency and even before economics. No wonder moderns stop in such places in wonder.

Yet the foundational story is hardly grand. A most unremarkable birth, to an unmarried mother, perhaps 14 years old, in a stable for animals in a one horse town. This story in the context of a people, historically un-noteworthy yet is celebrated by most of us, one way or another. The church and our culture has attempted to line this story with riches, or tinsel and sparklers. There were 3 wise men, reading their horoscope in a far away country who read of a king and blow me down if a star didn't lead them to stable. A star with a laser beam into a stable. Who were these wise men? Some say they were Zoroastrian priests from Persia (Iran). What are these people doing in a story about a Jewish baby? You know what? I don't really know. It's fantastic and unlikely and should encourage us to stand back far enough to look for the message that generates the story.

The baby born didn't really make it to greatness. So many people giving each other expensive presents in honour of this homeless, undocumented, middle eastern wanderer. This bloke tipped over the tables in the temple and made a whip to drive out the occupants, didn't win any oscars, didn't write anything and ultimately, died the agonising death of a criminal. So, happy Christmas. Pause long enough to catch the strangeness of the life we accept as ordinary.

The point of the story is that this baby was a kid like any other and that he grew to understand that the Divine rested easiest and most naturally in the human. That greatness comes to those who don't claim it and those who claim greatness are involved in an exercise of hollowing out their being. It really is good news for ordinary folk. It's good news for the poor. It's good news for the frail. It offers relief to those, game enough to know that life isn't all about them – to those who will let God be God – to those who need to kid themselves about very little.

To celebrate the story beneath the tinsel and wrapping paper, is to find yourself capable of community.

Gadfly

Sociologists tell us Christmas is a dangerous time of the year. The stats for December depression show that all over the country there are people feeling left out and teary.

Well, maybe so. What they don't yet realise is it's only a fraction of the real collateral disaster of the jolly Santa season. And it's getting worse every year. But the real snake in the stocking is the pernicious practice of plastic packaging! It is a worldwide blight. It not only causes millions of cut fingers spilling more rivers of blood than you'd find in a dozen Stanley Kubrick movies of Jack Nicholson going nuts in a deserted hotel, but I can also personally testify that it drives formerly peaceable grandfathers into wild, demented beasts.

It began so innocently. When Wendy and I furnished our first house in the then distant reaches of Pearce in the great Canberra expansion of the 1970s, my bride proudly ordered a small bookcase. To my surprise it arrived in a package of timber bound in soft plastic with another small bag containing four little legs. 'This'll be fun,' I thought, rolling up my sleeves to conquer this DIY challenge to my manhood.

I opened the instructions (in several languages). First step, 'Take the allen key...' it said. I was instantly stumped. I searched the plastic bag – nothing even vaguely resembling a key...and who was Allen anyway? Wendy was no help. She had a cousin named Alan but he was back in Temora and she didn't know his phone number. Actually, the phone wasn't even connected so we couldn't call her Dad in Red Hill either.

Undeterred, I saddled up with a few nails and screws and a new product called Super Glue. Three hours later – after I'd finally unstuck myself from the furniture and the shagpile carpet – we had the only bookcase in Canberra that Picasso would have applauded for its engaging cubist influences. It held its books upright with the iron Wendy discarded from her trousseau after declaring 'the end of the iron age.'

What we didn't realise was that it was the beginning of a terrible trend. In the next decade the plastic packaging industry took off. Supermarkets started putting more fruit and vegies in packs; and in time they'd price them so you always bought more than you needed and they'd spoil before you ate the last of them.

But the real demons were the hardware people. Where once you could buy however many individual nails or screws you needed for a job, now you had to buy a packet containing enough to build a substantial granny flat.

Then they packaged everything in hard plastic – even the tools you needed to open the packaging to get to the other stuff. And this year, they've gone right over the top. They now package women's cosmetics in such hard plastic that it defies the sharpest scissors to get to the soft, downy powder inside. And here's the ultimate Chrissy crusher. The packages of bon-bons with their little Chinese sayings and paper hats are themselves secreted behind hard plastic shells!

The solution? Easy – just sharpen the kitchen scissors to such a fine edge that the hard plastic will bare its contents to the celebraters. Trouble is, the scissor sharpener itself is protected by a hard, transparent plastic covering that defies all efforts to remove it.

That's when the formerly peaceable grandfather begins to feel a tingling at the base of the spine that presages what I call the terminal transformation. One glance at the dining room mirror, and Mr Peaceable's facial features are suddenly reminiscent of Jack Nicholson himself. Yes, there's that unforgettable, lascivious Christmas grin. Construction completed on new Goulburn Clinical Training Facility

Southern NSW Local Health District reports: Take a peak inside the new Clinical Training Facility at Goulburn Base Hospital, which was completed this month.

The Australian National University's (ANU) Clinical Training Facility was delivered by Health Infrastructure in close collaboration with staff from the ANU Rural Clinical School and Southern NSW Local Health District.

Built alongside the \$165 million Goulburn Hospital and Health Service Redevelopment, the new, purpose-built two-storey building will provide medical and other health professional students with a state-of-the-art training facility.

The completed ANU Clinical Training Facility includes:

- A simulation room replicating a real hospital environment
- Clinical skills rooms
- Tutorial rooms
- An auditorium and meeting rooms
- Medical student study and common room spaces
- ANU staff office, workspaces, and staff room
- Local Health District Clinical Nurse Educators office space
- Clinical Library
- Storage spaces

The facility is expected to begin operating in early 2024 after staff move-in activities are completed. Work on the Goulburn Hospital and Health Service Redevelopment is continuing, and is scheduled for final completion in mid-2024.

FUTURE FARMER

Growing tucker where they told him he couldn't, since the turn of the century

Happy Holidays.

Congratulations! All your effort in spring, and the risks you took, have resulted in an amazing summer garden. It's been a good growing season, the recent rain has really boosted growth and now the summer heat is ripening tomatoes early.

If you haven't got your summer veggies established by now, it's probably a bit late to guarantee any success. Our short growing season is the reason it's important to get your timing right in spring and take some risks. Although I'm an advocate for planting anytime... sometimes the effort is worth the risk, but rarely late in summer.

Garden Visits

I've had the pleasure of visiting some gardens recently, to witness abundance and success. Every garden as unique as the human that created it. I'm as impressed by the setups and systems of established gardeners as much as the novice having a go for the first time. Starting the journey is the most important part of growing your own food, then you gain experience and grow better with less effort.

Gardening and growing food is as easy or as hard as you choose to make it. Working with mother nature to replicate natural systems, or against it with machines and chemicals. Most folks are running a game somewhere in between and having mixed results. It does take a mindset shift, a bit of unlearning and some slowing down to gain a better understanding of your ecosystem. If we can adopt a growing style that requires less input and effort, we will have more time, more nutrient dense food in our bellies and fatter stock.

Timing

At this time of year, demands for our time can be high. Getting caught up in the festive season rituals can take us away from our garden. Fortunately, the work has already been done so you can sit back and enjoy your holidays, however you choose to spend them. Picking ripe berries and veggies is all you will need to do in the garden, because you got your timing right this season.

I stood in the presence of only one greenhouse, a testament to gardening success without one in our Unpredictable Highland Climate. There was something growing in there, the only veggie that really needs the benefit of the extreme hothouse climate.

Capsicums and Chillies prefer soil temps above 25C and love the added humidity and heat in the air. These plants can also be overwintered in the greenhouse for a bigger, better, earlier crop next season.

This greenhouse was cleverly shaded from the western sun by a mighty fig tree, and sun protection netting. Western sun on a greenhouse in our region will probably even toast a chilli plant, it will toast a tomato plant with ease.

Success

The greatest success in the garden was from Bombay Seed Traders Zucchinis and Bush Pumpkins. Every bush pumpkin has at least 10 pumpkins on the plant already, with some changing colour to signify ripening. This has always been my experience, so it's great to see it on a broader scale. Better break out all the old pumpkin recipes this season.

This week

I've built a trellis on the fence for the 2 Tommytoes, as they have sprawled and taken over their allotted area. The trellis is 6ft tall, and 8ft wide, but I expect the plants to fill that space in a week or two. The heat has been great for ripening tomatoes, and full bushes of fruit are taking advantage of it. Eating Ripe Tomatoes in early December is the best Xmas present ever!

The first Cornsilks have popped below the seed heads. This corn was planted amongst the broad beans for frost protection, survived the Black Frost ed 182 and is set to be the earliest corn I will have eaten from my garden. Fingers crossed.

There seems to be less tomatoes going to the mice. Wasn't sure where they went... then last night I spied two of the biggest tawny frogmouths I've ever seen. It also explains the wild raspy noise we hear most nights. I love owls.

I've planted more vine pumpkins, very late, but they were flowering in their tiny pots, so in the ground they went. If the first frost is late like last year they'll be just fine, if not then chicken food. The new beds now have improved fencing to keep the critters out, with proper fencing to come please Santa.

And always exciting, baby chickens are hatching under a new mum. A cracking start to the new year.

The first Bruchetta of the season was eaten very early this year. I mark my summer by what I eat from the garden and when, because Summer days can sometimes blur. Basil, garlic and tomatoes ready together in mid December is ace. The earliest yet. Everything gets these toppings this week.

Basil

Basil is starting to flower, the first plants have been in the ground for about 60days, so picking for pesto commences now too. Picking basil is best done by nipping the tips off, rather than taking lower leaves. Each tip creates 2 or more growing stems providing more fresh basil leaves. The lower leaves stay as solar collectors to keep things growing along. Picking lower leaves makes your basil plants look sickly and they will under perform for you.



The coming weeks will require water, water and more water, to keep your garden happy and productive. Hopefully more Skywater will fall, but it's anyone's guess, even the weatherbots. (It's raining as I edit, yay)

Whatever you find yourself doing over the Xmas break, do it well and play safe. I'm loving the chats, notes, messages, photos and garden invites. Thank you so much.

And thank you for playing along at home and validating this highland growing experience. Until next year...

RURAL BUSINESSES WARNED: SAFETY FIRST WITH FARM VISITORS THIS SUMMER

SafeWork NSW is urging farmers and rural businesses to take practical steps to keep visitors to farms safe during the summer school holidays by restricting access to dangerous machinery and other hazardous risks.

To make sure visitors are aware of specific dangers, SafeWork recommends compiling a list of farm safety rules specific for visitors to keep them safe. There are a number of easy tasks you can perform before visitors arrive, including:

- Identifying 'no go' areas to keep visitors away from working areas of the farm
- Make sure visitors know to stay out of fenced areas and away from livestock which are unpredictable
- Store plant, equipment, tools and chemicals securely and remove the keys from quad bikes, side-by side vehicles (SSV) and tractors
- Don't let quad bikes, SSV's or tractors be used for rides
- Make sure all passengers in SSV's wear a seat belt and never carry passengers in the rear cargo tray
- Never allow a child under 16 on an adult sized quad bike and never allow passengers
- Ensure all guards are fitted to power take offs or PTO's, augers and other equipment
- Cover voids, pits and other falls risks
- Empty water drums and alert visitors to dams, water courses and other drowning hazards
- Ensure silo ladders and top hatch access is locked
- Ensure all confined spaces, like tanks and silos are not accessible
- Set up safe delivery areas to load and unload livestock or product that separates people and vehicles
- Supervise children at all times – especially around machinery, dams and sheds.





Yoga pose of the week

with Christina Carroll

Abdominal Stretch Pose - Udarakarshanasana

A great yoga pose to stretch and massage the abdominal organs and muscles. Renown for improving digestion and removing constipation.

To practice - Squat with the feet flat on the floor (or as close to the floor) a comfortable distance apart. Place the palms of the hands on the knees. With the help of right hand, gently guide the right knee to left foot. Press the left knee in towards the right leg. Simultaneously turn the head towards the left to gaze over the left shoulder. Lightly squeeze both knees towards each other to compress the abdomen. Hold for a few seconds then raise the right knee back to the squatting position. In the same way lower the left knee to the right foot and gaze over the right shoulder. Practice 5-10 rounds.
