## Education Foundation 2024 grant recipients

The Braidwood and District Education Foundation (BDEF) began celebrations of its milestone 20th year championing local students and trainees at its annual presentation evening last Friday night. A total of 27 grants were offered this year to supporting young locals in their pursuit of post-school training and studies in various fields, including apprenticeships, TAFE, and universities across the nation, and 18 enthusiastic young individuals were in attendance at the Braidwood Servicemen's Club to accept in person.

During the event, attendees, including recipients, families, donors, and special guests, were treated to inspiring speeches from diverse speakers. Alisa Stephens, the BDEF Chair, expressed the committee's gratitude for the unwavering support of the Braidwood community, citing a remarkable \$650,000 in grants distributed among more than 320 scholarships since the Foundation's inception in 2004. Renowned local historian and retired school teacher, Jill Clarke, delved into 175 years of educational history from Braidwood and its surrounding districts.

The BDEF committee extends heartfelt congratulations to all grant recipients and expresses gratitude to the generous donors for their steadfast support. A special acknowledgement goes to Jarrah Parsons, herself a former BDEF grant recipient, for capturing the essence of the presentation event through photography.

## Upgrade Works to Telstra Mobile Base Station at Mt Gillamatong

The Telstra project team advises that there has been a change within the overall schedule to the transmission upgrade work to the base station that provides mobile coverage to Braidwood and surrounds, including the Kings Highway.

As a result, the Monga site will now be disrupted for 8 hours per day on 7 & 8 February (previously advised 15 & 16 February).

There is also a contingency day on 12 February if required. An SMS will be sent from this site to notify customers. There are no changes to the overall scheduled dates previously advised for the work at Mt Gillamatong -

The first phase of disruptions will occur daily between 7am and 5pm from Monday 5 February to Friday 9 February 2024.

The second phase of disruptions will occur from Saturday 10 February to Wednesday 15 February 2024. The site is expected to be off the air for this entire period. The Mt Gillamatong site will be in service on Saturday 10 February to ensure mobile reception is available for the Braidwood race meeting.

If all goes according to plan and weather permitting, residents should be noticing an improvement in Telstra mobile services by 16 February 2024.

Landline services, NBN internet services and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted. Any calls to Triple Zero from a Telstra mobile when the site is off air will automatically be diverted to any working mobile network for connection to emergency services. Regional General Manager for Telstra, Chris Taylor said while our crews need to work during daylight for safety, we'll only be switching off the site when we need to and have it back on as quickly as possible.

"There's never a good time to undertake this sort of work but once it is completed, it will mean better mobile services for local residents," Mr Taylor said. "As a company, we heavily invest in improving regional connectivity and this site is another example of our commitment. Over the past seven years to the end of FY23, Telstra invested \$11 billion in our mobile network nationally, with \$4 billion of this invested in our regional mobile network."

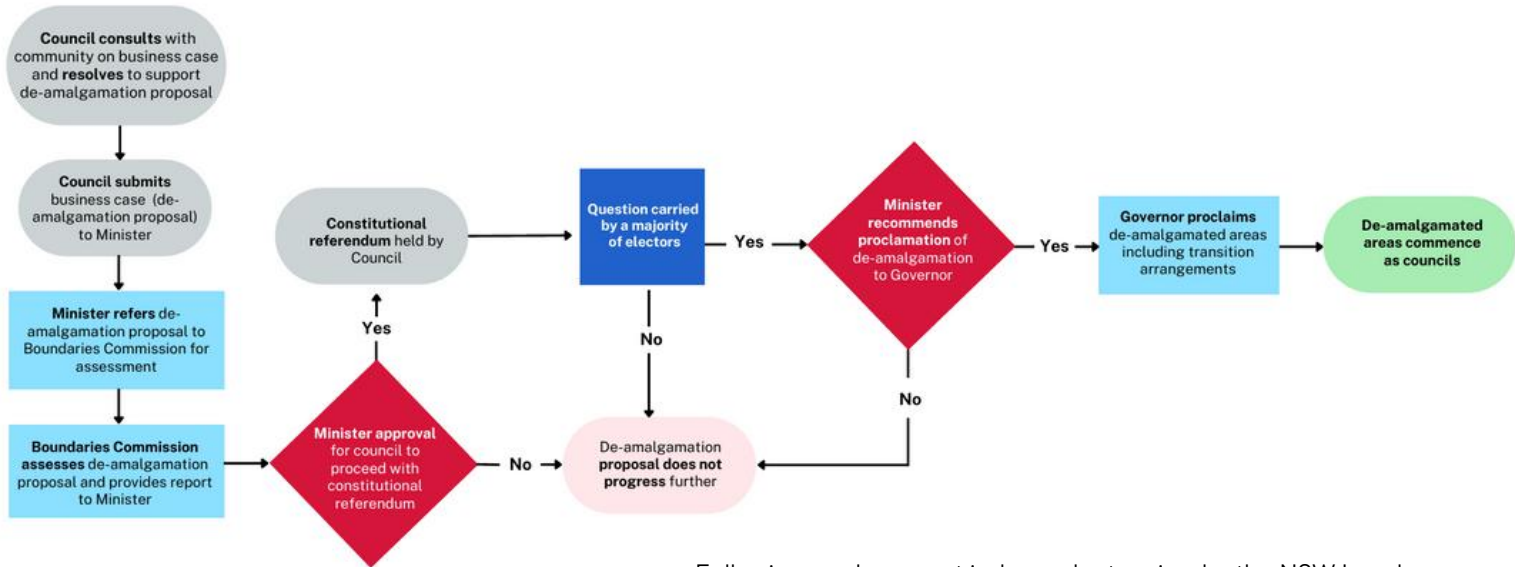




## De-amalgamation bill delivers certainty for NSW councils



### PROPOSED DE-AMALGAMATION PROCESS



The **NSW Government** has introduced new legislation that will remove a major roadblock to council de-amalgamations and ensure local democracy is enshrined in the decision-making process.

The amendments to the Local Government Act 1993, introduced to Parliament today (FEB 6), will provide a new legal pathway for NSW councils seeking to demerge, including those that already have de-amalgamation proposals under consideration.

The amendments repeal the legally flawed section 218CC of the Act and replaces it with a clear and democratic process. This follows years of failed policy making by the former government that left councils across NSW in limbo and failed to take into account the budgetary impacts for NSW taxpayers on proposed de-amalgamations.

Under the changes, councils wishing to de-amalgamate must develop a robust business case upfront. This must consider the financial impacts and council's ability to fund de-amalgamation, long-term strategic plans and the service delivery capacity of the new demerged councils.

Councils will also be required to undertake community consultation on the business case.

Upon receipt from a Council, the Minister must forward a business case to the NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission.

Following a subsequent independent review by the NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission, the Minister may then approve a constitutional referendum with a compulsory vote, which would require majority support from local electors to proceed with a de-amalgamation. In addition, the Government's Bill provides transition arrangements for councils which have already been approved for demerger by the Minister. Quotes attributable to Minister for Local Government Ron Hoenig:

"The forced amalgamation of NSW councils was a failed and expensive experiment.

"While the NSW Government strongly supports a clear process for councils and communities to exercise their democratic right to pursue de-amalgamation, we also have to be realistic about some of the challenges this brings.

"It's why one of my main priorities as Local Government Minister has been to find a way to remove the roadblocks posed by the existing demerger process, and give communities the opportunity to decide.

"These amendments the Government has introduced provide a clear path forward for councils wishing to de-amalgamate, providing much more clarity for current and future proposals.

"However, it's essential that local democracy is enshrined in the decision-making process so that councils and communities are fully informed of the financial and other implications of de-amalgamation.

"The amendments we have introduced are more pragmatic than other legislative proposals being put to Parliament and ensure de-mergers can be effectively managed by councils and that any new councils are financially sustainable."

## Quality Start Program for BCS Primary Students

Braidwood Central School (BCS) primary students are set for a year of learning with the Quality Start Program conducted on their first day back at school.

BCS Deputy Principal, Ms Kim Glenday, oversaw the program. Ms Glenday said "The interactive program is designed to encourage new friendships, promote positive learning, outline classroom expectations, develop problem solving strategies and help students create an awareness of social and emotional well-being. A range of teaching and learning strategies were used including ice breakers, collaborative learning, creative activities and role plays."

Acronyms were used throughout the day to crystallise key learnings.

Ms Glenday continued "A key acronym was CHIRPP which stands for 'care', 'harmony', 'integrity', 'positivity' and 'perseverance'. The students used 6 different coloured pages to brainstorm the meaning of each value. Students were then divided into 6 groups to provide examples of each of the values."

Well-being was also a key topic covered.

Ms Glenday said "The CHIRPP values led to activities on well-being with students identifying a range of emotions divided into zones ranging from 'feeling calm, happy and ready to learn' (green zone) all the way through to 'anger, yelling and aggression' (red zone). Considerable time was spent on the 'triggers' that push students into the various zones. It is important for students to recognise that we are in different zones at different times so we can learn to manage our emotions. It is what we do with these emotions that counts."

Year 5 student Everett Robertson-West enjoyed the program. Everett said "We have a clear understanding of expectations for this year. I enjoyed the rock painting and the teamwork activities. My key learning from the day was it is important to speak the truth but it is also important to be aware how others feel."

BCS Principal, Ms Nerida Mosely is confident the Quality Start Program has provided a solid foundation for learning, classroom behaviour and student well-being across the primary school. Ms Mosely said "The program has been developed by our staff, tailored to meet the needs of our primary school students and has ensured a very positive start to the school year."

# Senior Study Hub key to learning success at BCS

Braidwood Central School (BCS) Year 11 students received a full day of induction at the commencement of their school year last Thursday.

Following a Welcome to Country, students were taken through;

1.Senior School Expectations: respect, engagement and leadership

2.Senior School Support Team

3.Timetables and subject selection

4.Study hub: respect and role

5.Assessments

6.Higher School Certificate (HSC) eligibility

7.Captains' process

8.Driving cars to school

9.Stage 6 well-being

A session also focused on 'student learning' including NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) HSC rules and a focus on the all important BCS Assessment Booklet.

Following morning tea, students were introduced to the Technical Support Officer, allocated laptops as required, logins facilitated and introduced to the NSW Mandatory Course 'All My Own Work'.

BCS provided a barbecue lunch for the students and the afternoon was allocated to team building and sport. BCS Deputy Principal, Ms Simone Walsh, organised the induction.

Ms Walsh said "BCS has a Senior School Support Team of a Deputy Principal, Stage 6 Head Teacher, Senior Hub academic coaches and mentors as well as student support officers and counselors to guide our students through their senior studies." The day also focused on the role of the Senior Study Hub.

Ms Walsh said "A senior teacher will be present for every lesson the students are timetabled for the Hub. The timetabled teachers are qualified across a range of subject areas including English, Economics, Mathematics, Design and Technology, and Music. BCS has made a major investment with the provision of our well resourced Senior Hub. BCS has ensured every senior student has been allocated with a laptop and they are encouraged to engage the timetabled teacher in the hub for advice and assistance from an academic as well as a well-being perspective."

Year 11 Student, Mark Radburn, found the day very helpful in transitioning to Stage 6.

Mark said "The teachers went out of their way to make us all feel comfortable and clearly outlined expectations. Key goals were covered and I am really pleased with the amount of support on offer. Clearly, the Senior Study Hub provides an opportunity to learn at our own place. It will be great to have access to 'one on one' learning from qualified teachers as well as the support from the Senior School Support Team."

BCS Principal, Ms Nerida Mosely thanked students and staff for the day.

Ms Mosely said "The feedback has been very positive. Our Senior School Support Team were able to cover a range of topics and address all students' concerns. BCS is in a position to offer professional support for all our senior students at every point in the school timetable."

## Council launches Towards 2042 consultation

**Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council** want to hear your ideas for the future of our region.

Council is helping get the word out and preparing the plan, but this is a community plan. This means that all kinds of organisations, community groups, and state agencies are responsible for making sure it happens.

The consultation period is open between 1 February and 15 March 2024.

### PLANT OF THE MONTH

#### Zantedeschia (Arum lily)

- Native to southern and eastern Africa
- Strong growing tuberous perennials
- Consisting of evergreen and deciduous types
- Grows to 60cm tall
- Leaves are glossy green, arrow shaped. Some are spotted
- Flowers come in many colours with a central yellow spadix
- Prefers sun or some shade
- Propagate from division in late winter

### What to do in the garden for February

- Lift Tulips and Dutch Iris for storage in a cool dry place
- Tie Dahlias and tall Chrysanthemums
- Dead head Rhododendrons, Camelias and Azaleas, mulch and feed
- Sow seeds of annuals for planting out in April
- This humid weather promoted black spot - spray if necessary
- Remove weeds before they seed
- Obtain spring flowering bulbs
- Sow seeds of Asian Greens, Radish, Spinach and Turnips
- Remove vegetable plants as they finish cropping
- Apply liquid fertilizer fortnightly to vegetables
- Remove excess growth from Apples and Pears
- Trim Lavender and Rosemary
- Take semi hardwood cuttings and keep moist

## 'EPA announces new protections for endangered Southern Greater Gliders'

### **NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA)**

Endangered Southern Greater Gliders across the east coast of NSW will be better protected under NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) amendments to forestry rules that will protect more hollow-bearing trees in operations where gliders are present.

From 9 February, changes to the Coastal Integrated Forestry Operations Approval (CIFOA) protocols will come into effect, requiring Forestry Corporation of NSW (FCNSW) to meet new protection requirements for southern greater gliders.

EPA Chief Executive Officer, Tony Chappel said the change was a significant step-forward in the long-term protection of gliders as well as other native animals reliant on hollow-bearing trees such as possums, owls and parrots.

"This change means that instead of depending on unreliable point in time surveys to find the habitat of the gliders, we will assume the species is present and conserve their habitat," Mr Chappel said.

"This ensures the critical habitats of some of our most endangered and much-loved native animals are protected.

"We have reviewed extensive research, sought expert views and believe this change strikes the right balance, resulting in significant ecological and regulatory improvement to the current arrangements.

"We have also consulted FCNSW to ensure any potential timber supply impacts are known and managed.

"If non-compliances with these new conditions are found, the EPA will not hesitate to take appropriate regulatory action to ensure greater gliders are being protected in forestry operations."

The new CIFOA requirements include:

A 50-metre exclusion zone around known recorded locations of greater glider dens.

Protection of extra greater glider trees in addition to existing hollow bearing and giant tree requirements:

Six trees per hectare greater than 80cm in diameter in high greater glider density areas, in addition to the eight hollow bearing trees currently required to be protected.  
Four trees per hectare greater than 50cm in diameter in lower density areas, in addition to the eight hollow bearing trees currently required to be protected.

The retention of additional hollows and future hollow-bearing trees in areas where greater gliders are less likely to occur.

Greater glider trees must prioritise hollows (especially ones with evidence of use) where they exist.

Undertaking of a monitoring program to ensure the ongoing effectiveness of these new rules for greater gliders.

## EPA's capitulation to Forestry Corporation puts Greater Gliders on a fast track to extinction

### **South East Forest Rescue**

The NSW Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) has just amended the logging rules so that Forestry Corporation NSW (FCNSW) no longer has to look for the dens of the Endangered Greater glider before it logs an area. This despite for months saying they were working on amendments to improve the survey requirements for gliders after FCNSW admitted they looked for the nocturnal species during the day.

Conservation group South East Forest Rescue (SEFR) has over the last few months been finding Greater Glider den trees that FCNSW has failed to find. One of these surveys resulted in a 40 day Stop work Order being issued to FCNSW in Flat Rock State Forest in November and being extended in December for another 40 days.

On Monday SEFR sent a new report to the EPA after finding another 4 den trees with Greater Gliders and sighting a further 9. Rather than issue another Stop Work Order the EPA has instead said to Forestry don't bother looking for anymore.

"This is an outrageous outcome by the EPA who are meant to be looking after our Endangered species. They will now be complicit in the extinction of Greater Gliders" said Scott Daines from SEFR. "It's a complete regulatory failure and an abrogation of their duty to protect gliders."

"For months we have been showing FCNSW and the EPA that if you put the effort in you will find den trees. It is obvious now that FCNSW doesn't want to find den trees and now the EPA has capitulated to FCNSW" said Scott Daines "Leaving a few extra habitat trees per hectare will not protect gliders and claiming this is a good result is astonishing."

"Chris Minns and Penny Sharpe need to step in and fix this debacle that the EPA and Forestry have caused or be forever known as the Premier and Environment Minister that wiped out Greater Gliders." said Scott Daines







## NSW Government introduces integrity reforms

The **NSW Government** is set to introduce reforms to help restore public trust and improve public integrity, transparency, and accountability.

The reform package will include amendments to the Independent Commission Against Corruption Act 1988 to make it a legislative requirement for the Government to respond to recommendations of the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) directed to the Government.

The NSW Government is also moving to address recommendations made by the ICAC in Operation Witney and Operation Keppel.

Operation Witney was an investigation into the former Member for Drummoyne and allegations concerning improper influence and breach of public trust.

In response to the investigation's findings, a draft regulation will be tabled in Parliament proposing to:

- expand the interests required to be disclosed by Members of Parliament
- require Members to disclose new matters including conflicts of interest
- require all Members to make disclosures on an ongoing basis instead of periodically, for publication on the NSW Parliament website.

The draft regulation, if made, will implement recommendations 1 and 4 of the Operation Witney report and bring NSW into line with the disclosure obligations in other Australian jurisdictions, including the Commonwealth.

The Government intends to introduce the proposed changes on 1 July 2024 after consultation with relevant Parliamentary Committees.

In response to Operation Keppel, which concerned the former Member for Wagga Wagga, the Government will amend the preamble to the NSW Ministerial Code of Conduct to include principles and guiding values recommended by the ICAC.

Further reforms include guidelines for the preparation and funding of business cases in respect of grant applications by non-government entities, and boosting education programs to ensure Ministers are aware of their integrity obligations.

The package of reforms reaffirms the Government's commitment to the highest standards of integrity. This builds upon recent announcements including a ban on political parties accepting donations from clubs which have gaming machines and the tightening of government grant regulations.

Premier Chris Minns said "Restoring trust in government is of the highest priority and we're pleased to build on our integrity reform agenda.

"It's critical that our expectations of every minister and every member is made clear.

"The people of NSW need to have faith that politicians and elected officials are acting in the public interest. That faith is central to a working and healthy democracy."

Special Minister of State John Graham said:

"There is no place for corrupt conduct in our Parliament and these reforms ensure every MP knows the rules and is held to the highest standard.

"We will continue to back in our independent integrity agencies and be unapologetic about responding decisively to their recommendations for the good of our state.

## State of Australia's Regions Report Released

The Australian Government has released the 2024 State of Australia's Regions report.

This new report showcases data and insights on key issues and opportunities impacting Australia's regions – further building the evidence base that supports our commitment to targeted and coordinated regional investment that works better for people and regions.

In line with the Government's Regional Investment Framework, which emphasises the importance of listening and responding to the voices, knowledge and priorities of regional Australians, the 2024 report focuses on contemporary and pressing issues as identified at the local level, including:

- ensuring regional workforces are positioned to meet the needs of today and tomorrow
- promoting the economic aspirations, cultures and languages of First Nations people
- supporting places with amenity, services and economic opportunities
- collaboratively addressing issues like housing availability and affordability and access to quality early childhood education and care,
- preparing for, responding to, and recovering from disasters, and
- responding to challenges and opportunities as we transition to a net zero emissions future.

The report also provides a snapshot of Australian Government initiatives and investments that are strengthening the productivity, liveability and sustainability of regional Australia, such as the Growing Regions Program, regional Precincts and Partnership Program and Better Connectivity Plan for Regional and Rural Australia.

## NSW Government commitment to tackle skills shortage

## Safety first as NSW public schools trial new purpose-built AI tool for students

A new purpose-built generative artificial intelligence (AI) app designed by the NSW Department of Education will begin to be trialled this term in 16 NSW public schools.

The app, called NSWeduChat, is built for use in education and suitable for school-aged children, unlike many commercially available AI apps.

Designed to be safe and ethical for use in schools, NSWeduChat is also directly relevant and appropriate for NSW classrooms, in line with key principles outlined in the Australian Framework for Generative Artificial Intelligence in Schools, which all Education Ministers agreed to in October.

Staff and students from 16 NSW public schools – 10 high schools, four primary schools, one School for Specific Purposes and one Environmental Education Centre – will participate in the trial of NSWeduChat over the first two terms of 2024.

Teachers will decide how they use the tool in their classrooms and students will also have access to the app via the department's student portal.

Trial participants will receive assistance and support from subject matter experts, professional learning and technical resources and a virtual staffroom.

The trial will be monitored and reviewed with the results to help inform the future direction of AI in NSW public schools.

'Alchemy' is the final coming together of the 15 Project Alchemy artists who have worked together for the last year on a series of cross disciplinary arts projects to build community connection across south-east Australia.

The project is facilitated by award winning Canberra based Rebus Theatre and has taken place in Bega Valley Shire, Eurobodalla Shire, East Gippsland, Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council, and the ACT with three artists selected from each region.

In November 2022 Rebus led its first of 2 residencies for the artists to heal their own trauma from the Black Summer Fires, and to develop skills and networks to further the possibility of trauma informed practice and arts-led economic recovery. Following on from the second residency in early 2023, artists have developed their organisational, artistic and leadership skills by working individually and in collaboration on projects. Their projects were creative and diverse with a focus on bringing about increased hopefulness and enhancing community spirit.

Projects have included community dances and movement jams, wonder walks through fire devesated properties, eco dying, printmaking, lantern, music and chromatogram workshops, cosplay tree planting, music and dance performances and visual art exhibitions. As well as running their own projects our artists have partnered with a range of festivals sharing their creative projects with audiences at The Daring Festival of Possibilities (Bega Valley Shire), River of Arts Festival (Bega Valley Shire) and Lakes Lights Festival (East Gippsland).

Project Alchemy artist Michele Grimston shares her experience. "This opportunity has been so powerful for me. I feel like it has allowed me to explore my practice in a new way, and to understand more deeply how supporting my own artistic practice and need to create can open up deeper spaces for me to support others in turn." A participant in one of Michele's workshops shared... "I've had such a beautiful day and such a restorative experience. Thank you so much for providing this space to come together and simultaneously be with ourselves. I'm so thrilled to have shared this space with everyone and with my new skill".

Examples of community works created during Michelles breathing space residency including a few small embroidered works and a larger collaborative piece will be on display in the exhibition.

For **Cecile Galiazzo, her project Wonder Walks** were an opportunity to bring together friends and others from across the QPRC region and ACT, to walk and talk and share and to see first hand the regeneration of the bush that was fire-affected. She reflects that this has given her a 're-appreciation' of the value of diversity of our community and landscapes and that they have been an inspiration that will continue to feed her arts practice.

A couple of concertina art books showcasing the drawing and painting taken during the walks will be on display during the exhibition along with a long string of prayer flags made from her eco-dying workshops.

After losing her studio and her lifes work Project Alchemy artist Sue Norman reflects... "At last, I'm living in the beautiful new home created from the ashes of my Kiah studio. For me, it is work to find my feet in the waves of grief coming at me from the wider knowledge of the government's intransigence despite even more dire warnings from the IPCC.... I'm avidly learning about trauma to understand how it works and how to teach our brains resilience; how we can buffer those overwhelming emotions to be as effective as possible in this time of need".

After seeking help from a bushfire counsellor, Sue started working with that counsellor on a public education project to present information about understanding trauma and the brain in an accessible way to volunteers and others working with people struggling with life's challenges since the fire. She has produced an illustrated handbook for understanding trauma and the brain with Colleen Weir called Nye on the River of Life which will available for free during the exhibition.

This rich, multimedia exhibition will showcase the artists personal journeys as well as their collaborative work and reach to their own communities. It will leave you touched with the profound difference that Project Alchemy has brought about for the artists as well as the hundreds of participants in the communities they have worked in.

Those who can make it to the official opening will get a chance to meet some of the artists who will be performing dance, music and poetry readings. Project Alchemy is made possible thanks to funding from the Australian Government for the Black Summer Bushfire Grant Program. Rebus is also supported by Ainslie and Gorman Arts Centres and the ACT Government.

## A technical study of landscape by Robyn Campbell

Canberra based multi-disciplinary artist Robyn Campbell will open an exhibition of new works at Suki & Hugh Gallery, Bungendore on Saturday 10 February, 3-5pm.

The exhibition entitled *Surface & Form* showcases works in ceramic, glass and drawing in Robyn's trademark style – contemporary clean lines and bold forms. Using surface texture to represent topical features of the land, Robyn shows her tremendous technical abilities.

The ceramic wall pieces are reminiscent of large river pebbles in organic, rounded shapes. Blackening and carving into the surface adds another layer of landscape suggesting grassland and topography.

The hand-built table-based sculptures are confident and curvy forms that distinctly represent the hills and alpine areas of and around the ACT and Southeast corner or NSW. These works offer an escape for the mind and eye evoking a journey through nature with views and valleys. Initially trained in glass at the School of Art, ANU Robyn completed a residency at the Canberra Glassworks in 2023. Her return to glass following time exploring clay has shown that her visual language can translate across various mediums at a high level.

In *Surface & Form* the artist will also show a small number of framed charcoal drawings.

Robyn Campbell works in both glass and ceramics. She studied Glass at the Canberra School of Art, Australian National University, under the tuition of Klaus Moje, Stephen Proctor and Elizabeth McClure.

After graduating in 1993, Robyn established a studio in Canberra and exhibited widely, both nationally and internationally. She was commissioned to create public artworks, taught part-time at the Australian National University and contributed to the arts community in a variety of roles.

A three-month fellowship at the Creative Glass Centre of America in 1995 gave Robyn the opportunity to focus on casting sculptures on a larger scale direct from a glass furnace. This time was formative and underpinned the development of her work over the following years.

### Reflection on the Gospel of Mark 1:40-45 by GPBS 6/2/24

#### A Dwelling Apart

Here's something curious: the leper and Jesus trade places in this story. At first, it's the leper who's forced into the wild by communal dread of his disease. In the end, it's Jesus who must retreat to the desert to avoid the crush of crowds brought on by publicity.

Biblical desert is a land of many facets. Literally, it's a place where life is challenging and death is near. Theologically, it's the domain of the devil, where temptation roams free. Both physical and spiritual realities of the desert made it a place to avoid when possible. To be sentenced to live there, with lepers and other outlaws, was a lonely and dangerous existence.

Yet Jesus, we know, often chose the desert. The Spirit first drove him there to test himself against the devil. Later, Jesus often returned there to pray and gather strength. Because he tamed the desert at the start of his journey, it was no longer a land of danger for Jesus, but a refuge. In the same way, we can surrender the desert terrain of our lives to the Spirit's authority, and let it be transformed into a sacred place.

Where are the desert areas in your life? How can they be transformed?

**Pray** - To one who is ill Jesus said: I choose to make you well. To those who suffer in our world, God says: You are my beloved ones; I know that I am with you and your suffering will not last forever. To the place of pain in our lives, God says: You may weep now but joy will come in the morning. May God's healing touch cover us and comfort us in this time and always. Amen.

**Ponder** - Find a place apart where you can sit in stillness or walk in solitude. Bring nothing with you and don't "fill up" the time and space with an agenda. Wait for Jesus to come and join you.

**Kids' Corner** - Jesus stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean." (Mark 1: 41)

In this week's Gospel, a man asks Jesus to heal him of his leprosy. Jesus sees his strong faith and responds. What a moment it must have been for the man to hear Jesus' words, feel Jesus' touch and see his own skin, clear and no longer covered with sores. Not everyone who comes to Jesus for healing has a disease like this man's. Some of us have hurts on the inside. We have worries. We have sins. But we have faith in Jesus. Like this man, we ask Jesus for healing. Try it today. Jesus, help me bring all my concerns to you. Amen.

### Mystical experience

Transfiguration Sunday is a day when we read about a strange - perhaps frightening - thing that happened to Jesus before he went to Jerusalem to suffer and to die upon the cross.

Mystical experience is very much a part of our faith as it lies at the root of much that we believe. There are spiritual things, spiritual realities beyond our understanding. The Transfiguration of Jesus is definitely one of these.

Remember, this the crux of the matter: the test of faith is not our experience of, or our knowledge of, invisible spiritual realities, but in whether we bear fruit that is pleasing to God. Living the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control, for example.

There are angels. There is a resurrection. Miracles still occur and prayers still reach the ear of God. God still speaks - in dreams and in visions - and through his Word. Yet despite the evidence that there are real but invisible and untouchable forces all around us, many people refuse to believe in God because they cannot see him; and of those who do believe, there are many who refuse to believe that God can do anything out of the ordinary.

There are many things, my friends, that we can't see, many things that we can't touch, which are real and powerful.

However, Church teaching has placed too little emphasis on the heart for too many years. The result is confusion and the rise of charlatans and cheats who mislead those who suspect that there is more to the world than meets the eye. A friend wandering into Handel's room found the composer in tears. He was finishing the last notes of the "Hallelujah Chorus". "I did think, while writing this", Handel exclaimed to his friend, "That I saw heaven before me, and our great God Himself."

What do you make of an experience such as Handel reported? Did he really see heaven? Did the disciples really see Jesus in glory? What difference did this make to their lives?

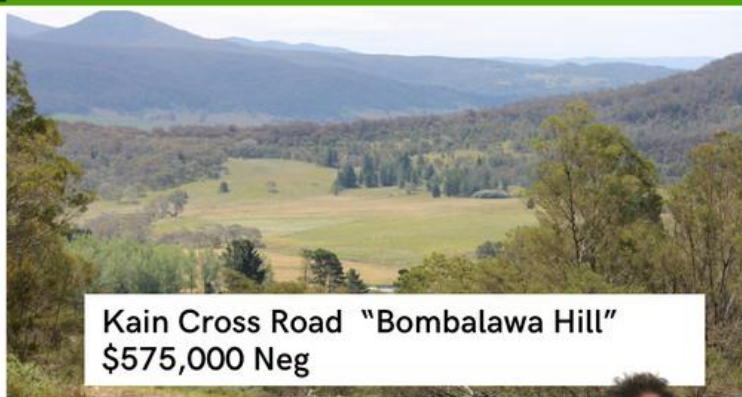

## Gadfly

To me, it's a simple choice – the tram or the hospital?

Regular readers will recall those unhappy nine hours I reported in July when advised by my GP to attend the Canberra Hospital's Emergency Department for a possible clot in the heart. I suspect they'll know which hand I'll raise.

For the uninitiated, having arrived at 5pm, I waited the usual four hours among the chaos before admission to the ED ward. And there I languished among the plastic cubicles, half-dressed and half-gowned, while the machines that go "ping!" played their torturous chimes, and the neglected woman in the next cubicle gradually dissolved into heart-rending tears.

Time adopts a new identity in an ED ward, especially when the "pings" are out of tune. It staggers forward then stops, reverses, and tries again, this time slipping sideways and spinning till the "pings" unite, then starts the fandango all over again.

By 1am she had reached the end of her tether and escaped untreated. I followed an hour and fifteen minutes later when the 'bed manager' had still not found a cot for my admission to a treatment ward. And there, I hoped, I could put the experience behind me.

Alas, it has proved impossible. It turns out that while my heart was clot-free the ordeal to my then weakened state – physical and mental – produced a 'setback' in my underlying COPD condition. The term describes the progressive descent of the symptoms – breathlessness, exhaustion, depression – toward the almost inevitable heart attack that finally extinguishes our brief candle.

One of the indicators became immediately apparent – a swelling of the ankles that signals heart failure, for which the best treatment is exercise and the occasional diuretic. That's partly why we bought a Unit with its own pool; but it's not designed for the seemingly endless winter of 2023!

Almost as frustrating was the mental cloud that formed around what had previously been my concept of the caring sanctuary of a hospital. This – in a nicer location – was the source of our greatest joy: the birth of our two sons, Robbie and Ben. And like most Canberrans we mourned its tragic passing when Chief Minister Kate Carnell made her one great mistake.

But that terrible implosion is long passed. The Barr-Rattenbury Government's mismanagement of its horrible successor was now a clear and present danger in my mind, even though I knew deep down that its staffers were kindly and conscientious. The compulsory post-operative visits there loomed like advancing nightmares. The breathlessness, I suspect, was as much mental as physical. But that didn't make it easier to bear, especially for a loving wife-cum-carer with her own natural concerns in the aging process.

Happily, a lifetime's devotion to authorship stepped in as two major projects demanded my total dedication – the biography of Charles Weston, the unheralded creator of Canberra's magnificent horticultural mantle; and the final scenes of my play, *The View from Golgotha*, set in the time and place of a great expectation.

But even they could not still the anger that rose whenever I looked back at the hospital starved for funds that could at least have provided treatment for my weeping neighbour in the plastic ED ward, and a bed for myself in the extremis of despair.

The outdated technology of a wildly expensive tramway seems a very poor substitute. Instead, I have a persistent vision of Mr Barr as Clark Gable in his famous final line of *Gone with the Wind*: 'Frankly my dear, I don't give a damn.'

# FUTURE FARMER

Growing tucker where they told him he couldn't, since the turn of the century

## Basic Passive Land Hydration

Another rain event blessed us this long, hot, dry summer. The garden hasn't needed my attention except to munch, and the growth from the Skywater is amazing. The land hydration offered was significant, if you had the systems in place. Otherwise, the water probably left your place quickly and took some of your topsoil with it.

If you are like me, you were out in the rain checking the waterflow. If you didn't get outside, the mulch and twigs riding in the solution will leave you some telltale signs, so check it out.

I touched on this in [Ed 184](#). Water is led by gravity and always falls downhill, even the slightest slope will create running water. Passive Land Hydration can only occur if the earth is permeable and contact lasts for an extended period.

## The might of water

As heavy rain runs down your slope it picks up speed, and volume, creating an unstoppable force. If the land has no abatement systems like grass, reeds, fallen trees or hedge rows the water will remove topsoil, create erosion and deposit sediment along the way. All the time trying to find the fastest, simplest way downhill.

After the fires, our hills were devastated. Fallen burnt trees everywhere. Topsoil covered in ash. So, when the February rains belted down, most of the ash and topsoil ended up filling the dams at the bottom of the hills. But not everywhere on the property.

Fortunately, while we were extinguishing spot fires, we were turning fallen logs on contour. These simple ledges, starting at the top of the system, created places for sediment to get trapped and water to soak.

## Where to start?

The top of the system is the best place to start, the water can't build up any speed or power. It is easily stopped and spread across the hill, before gently overflowing into the next log ledge. The sediment stayed behind and filled gaps creating a small earth bank for water to soak and nutrient to build.

The logs are now hard to spot as the grasses and groundcovers have capitalised and smothered the space. The areas of exposed rock are now becoming somewhat colonised by grasses covering the rocks in a living mulch, in turn creating more topsoil.

## Strange things

I've been watching my neighbour remove all the fallen timber from his hillside. The effort is incredible. There are many large piles of timber along the front of his property. If only he had turned them on contour where they laid.

I'm sure he will burn all that nutrient when summer passes, just like men have done before him. If he just burnt the piles at the top of the hill, the land would receive some benefit.

The chances of grass growing on the now exposed rock is slim at best. If only he had approached his block with a mindset to protect his precious topsoil.

All his toiling has removed resistance to water flowing downhill. Landcare have a well-established program of creating forests on top of hills, so it's strange to see the opposite happening.

## Keep the logs

Turning the logs, rather than removing them, creates sediment traps on the hill. Fallen logs and branches provide mulch, as described in [Ed 177](#). Eucalypts are masters at it. Wet logs create better habitat for microbes and fungi to decompose the carbon and create more topsoil.

Fallen logs break down over decades and create amazing building blocks for topsoil. Decaying logs have more life on them than a living tree does, so removing them is stealing habitat from your ecosystem, causing erosion problems and reducing biodiversity.

We have plenty of rocks on our hill, so we put them to good use too. Turning logs and rocks on contour is the simplest way you can start Passive Land Hydration at your place. As a remediation technique this is the first place to start. It's a simple cost-effective way to capture and store your Skywater, reduce erosion and improve productivity on your patch of earth.

## Finding Contour

Over the years I have become a human laser level, reading landscapes with reasonable accuracy. But it wasn't always that way. I have used a few different types of tools to get there and plenty of saddle time. I first started with a trusty screed level. Simply accurate but only over short distances.

For larger distances I tried water levels. Two stakes with a clear hose in between. Good for medium garden areas limited only by the length of hose. Difficult to use over multiple days as the water evaporates and requires recalibrating. And don't let them fall over.

A traditional method is to use an A frame with a plumb bob. The frame can be walked across a landscape with ease. It takes a bit to get the hang of the swinging weight but can be constructed from found objects.

In the 21st century laser levels are readily available, they are cheap, very accurate and can be used over large distances. They are my preference.

## Slow it, spread it, soak it

My mission with water is to slow the flow, starting at the top of the system. By the time a powerful rushing flow gets to the bottom of the system there is no way to stop it. Anything in the way at the bottom of the system will get washed away, just like happened on the Cooma Road project over the holidays. And many roads in the region before.

If we have the foresight to slow the flow, we will need to spread it on contour so that the land is hydrated evenly. If only a small amount falls, it will be shared across the landscape.

Spreading water on contour reduces the power of the flow, as there is no fall. The overflow can occur in a space that is advantageous. Perhaps through reeds, grasses or hedgerows. This watershed will flow across the land and get caught downhill, to slow it and spread it again.

Continuing this technique all the way downhill will accommodate small events, holding the water on your property a short while longer. The result is less erosion, more topsoil, and the plants nearby will benefit greatly from the nutrient and water load and your damp timber is less likely to burn in a fire.

## New telco safeguards to protect Australians doing it tough

The Albanese Government has directed the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA) to make it mandatory for telcos to provide financial hardship assistance to all customers experiencing difficulties paying their bills, including prioritising keeping customers connected.

The new Industry Standard on Financial Hardship will help protect telco consumers struggling to pay their phone and internet bills, and also ensure staff are appropriately trained and systems are in place to proactively identify consumers who may be experiencing financial hardship.

The new rules will ensure telcos do all they can to avoid disconnecting Australians struggling with cost-of-living pressures, given how essential telecommunications are in everyday life. These safeguards will cover mobile services as well as internet and voice services used by individuals and small business.

The Standard replaces the rules on financial hardship that are currently in the Telecommunications Consumer Protections (TCP) Code, and provide the ACMA with greater flexibility and oversight to ensure that telcos are assisting their customers struggling with their bills.

The Government announced it would direct the ACMA to make the mandatory industry standard in July last year.

The new rules will come into effect on 29 March 2024.

The Government acknowledges the constructive engagement of industry through this process. The consultation sought stakeholder views on the adequacy of the draft, various implementation considerations and transitional arrangements for the Standard's replacement of the current financial hardship rules within the TCP Code.

## Fels' review confirms corporate practices as key drivers of inflation

### The Australia Institute | Centre for Future Work

The Australia Institute welcomes the report of the Inquiry Into Price Gouging and Unfair Pricing Practices, chaired by Prof Allan Fels, and delivered today to the Australian Council of Trade Unions.

Key points:

- The Australia Institute and its Centre for Future Work, which were among the first to identify the role of record-high corporate profits in driving the acceleration of inflation after the COVID lockdowns, made a major submission to the Fels inquiry and appeared before its public hearing in Melbourne in September 2023
- A 2023 Centre for Future Work report showed that over two-thirds of excess economy-wide inflation (above the RBA's 2.5% target) from end-2019 through the September quarter of 2022 was attributable to higher unit corporate profits.
- Australia Institute reports documented that the rise in profits was strongest in industries with concentrated or strategic power in the broader economy: including mining and energy, manufacturing, construction and wholesale trade.

"Prof Fels' careful review confirms that price-setting strategies by corporations, including many obviously unfair and exploitative practices, have contributed significantly to the cost-of-living crisis afflicting Australian households," said Greg Jericho, Chief Economist for the Australia Institute.

"Since the current inflationary cycle began after COVID lockdowns, there has been too much attention on wages, labour costs, and consumer spending as the supposed drivers of higher prices. The RBA and other policy-makers have been too slow to acknowledge the role of profit and greed in pushing up prices.

"This inquiry marshals abundant evidence from official statistical agencies, international economic organisations, think tanks and academic research to show that corporations have taken advantage of the pandemic and its aftermath to exploit consumers and drive up inflation.

"Prof Fels' report contributes to a more accurate understanding of what is causing the cost-of-living crisis, and a more balanced and fair strategy for solving it.

"Australian corporate profits have moderated in the last year, as supply chains were repaired and energy prices retreated. This has been crucial to the partial slowdown in inflation experienced in the same time.

"But further reductions in prices for many essential goods and services are required to fully repair living standards, and Prof Fels' recommendations for more exposure of excess prices and stronger competition measures to reduce them would help a lot."

## Supermarket prices impacting public health

The **NFF Horticulture Council** has echoed concerns raised by the Australian Greens with the results of their recent consumer survey revealing more than half (56%) of all Australians are buying less fruits and vegetables as a result of higher prices.

Council Chair Jolyon Burnett said the survey results point towards the wider impacts of higher prices for fresh food, including on public health.

"As a nation we already struggle to meet our daily recommended intake of at least two serves of fresh fruits, five serves of vegetables and 30 grams of nuts," said My Burnett.

"Latest numbers from the Australian Bureau of Statistics show just over 6% are consuming enough vegetables and almost twice the proportion of adults reported that they do not usually eat fruit daily in 2022 when compared to over a decade ago.

"Consumer perceptions of high prices are unfortunately feeding into this issue with direct consequences for the wellbeing of individuals and the future of our health system.

"Studies show our unhealthy diets, against other causes, account for the greatest number of preventable deaths each year in Australia at 27,500, greater than tobacco by more than 10,000 deaths annually. "Without an intervention, the burden of lifestyle disease on our health system is only going to grow.

"When it comes to considering how it might make domestic markets for fresh fruits, vegetables and nuts work better, there are other factors the government might consider in addition to ensuring they are more efficient, transparent and fair.

"For now, we are calling on the Federal Government to make a significant investment in a public health campaign targeted at arresting and turning around the downward trends in fresh fruit, vegetable and nut consumption in this country.

"Given the downstream returns for the health system, we can hardly think of a better investment."

## Community outrage as renewable plans fall short

Energy developers need to work better with landholders and community members with a report finding major opposition to renewables.

Far from isolated cases of 'NIMBYism', the final report from the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner's Community Engagement Review found 92 per cent of landholders and community members were unhappy with consultation on renewable energy projects planned for rural and regional NSW.

Commissioned by Energy Minister Chris Bowen, the report also found a national transition to renewable energy would not succeed without effective community participation in infrastructure developments.

**NSW Farmers Energy Transition Working Group chair Reg Kidd said** farmers had not been fairly consulted by energy developers and bore the brunt of the nation's switch to more renewable sources of power.

"This tells us what we've known for a long time, there is a shocking lack of consultation we've seen in farming regions to date around these renewable projects," Mr Kidd said.

"The sheer number of recommendations demonstrates the extent of this failure to properly engage rural Australia in decisions that will directly affect their livelihoods and ability to produce enough food to sustain our growing population."

While Mr Kidd welcomed the report's efforts to suggest ways forward in improving community consultation on renewable energy projects, he warned serious action must be taken to prevent further damage to rural communities.

"We need to see real action taken by the government to properly plan how we can achieve this transition to renewable energy, without destroying food producing land or paving over our iconic landscapes," Mr Kidd said.

"Farmers are on the front line of a fight to protect not only our most productive farmland, but our rural communities, from the effects of this poor planning for our state's energy supply – and we're seeing little concrete action from governments to stop the damage.

"Tangible actions such as implementing a mandatory code of conduct for transmission and large-scale renewable projects, and creating an integrated development plan for renewable energy, are what we really need to see progress on before it's too late."

## AI sparks concerns among journalists despite low usage, survey finds

Seventy-nine percent of Australian journalists were concerned about the impact that generative AI could have on the overall integrity or quality of journalism in 2023, Medianet's latest Media Landscape Report finds.

Based on a survey of more than 800 Australian journalists, the report revealed that while most journalists (74%) had not yet personally used generative AI in their work and 19% were not aware of how AI is being used in their newsrooms, 67% of respondents believed that generative AI could potentially replace aspects of their jobs. Further, twelve percent of respondents claimed to know someone who has lost work or lost work themselves due to the uptake of generative AI in 2023.

Medianet Managing Director, Amrita Sidhu, said that the heightened fear from journalists could stem from the lack of awareness about how AI is being used in newsrooms and its potential impact on journalistic integrity.

"The introduction of generative AI has sparked concerns among journalists, but it's essential to bridge the gap between concerns and real-world impact," Sidhu said.

The report also shows findings on journalists' average salaries, once again highlighting gender pay gaps in the media industry.

From the findings, journalists have not been immune to cost-of-living challenges. 'Money' was identified as the greatest challenge of 43% of respondents in 2023, while 67% felt they were underpaid. Conversely, female journalists earning over \$100,000 increased by 7% from the previous year.

In a year where the platform formerly known as Twitter received significant publicity following the company's acquisition by Elon Musk and subsequent rebrand to X, there was a significant drop in professional Twitter/X usage in 2023.

The platform dropped from being the second most used social media platform for journalists in 2022 to being the fourth most-used platform, after Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn. Fifty-eight percent of respondents said they used Twitter/X in 2023 down from 69% in 2022. Ten percent identified having either recently deleted their account or stopped using it in 2023. A quarter of respondents (26%) said they still had an account but rarely used Twitter/X for professional purposes in 2023.

Journalists disclosed their main motivations to report on stories, with 80% stating their primary motivation is to inform the public accurately and fairly.

## Delivering Australians more choice of cars to save on fuel

The **Federal Government** is delivering more cars that are cheaper to run, giving motorists choice by introducing a New Vehicle Efficiency Standard for Australia.

The United States has had a similar policy in place for fifty years. But because of a decade of delay and denial, Australia still stands alongside Russia as one of the only advanced economies without the Standard. This is costing families and businesses thousands of dollars at the petrol pump.

The Albanese Government's New Vehicle Efficiency Standard will push car makers to give Australian motorists more choices of new cars, utes and vans that use less fuel and that have until now only been available to buyers in overseas markets.

The preferred model for the New Vehicle Efficiency Standard, made available today on [cleanercars.gov.au](http://cleanercars.gov.au), has been under development since the Government committed to the Standard last year - to ensure it strikes the right balance in giving Australians more choice while using less petrol.

If Australia catches up with the Standard in the U.S. by around 2028, Australians stand to save about \$1000 per vehicle per year.

The Standard will only apply to new passenger and light commercial vehicles, not used or existing vehicles. They work by providing car companies with targets for average emissions per kilometre from new vehicles sold.

The New Vehicle Efficiency Standard will deliver more vehicles to Australia with the latest engine and design technologies to ensure lower fuel bills, meaning bigger savings at the petrol pump.

The Albanese Government will consult on the preferred model for a month and introduce the legislation as soon as possible, with the new cost saving rules to come into effect by 1 January 2025.

Minister for Climate Change and Energy, Chris Bowen said "Because of a lack of action on an Efficiency Standard, Australian families are paying around \$1000 a year more than they need to be for their annual fuel bill - the Albanese Government is delivering long-term cost-of-living relief to fix that for new vehicles and put money back in people's pockets."

"We're giving Australians more choice to spend less on petrol, by catching up with the U.S- this will save Australian motorists \$100bn in fuel costs to 2050."

"This is about ensuring Australian families and businesses can choose the latest and most efficient cars and utes, whether they're petrol and diesel engines, or hybrid, or electric."

## Auto industry scores government's Fuel Efficiency Standard 7 out of 10

The Motor Trades Association of Australia (MTAA) - the largest representative of the automotive sector in Australia - welcomes the Federal Government's release of its Fuel Efficiency Standard impact assessment.

"The government has had to balance two extremes - the car companies and the single focused EV lobby. I cannot underestimate the difficulty in developing this standard. It has taken three governments and 12 years to reach this point. Nobody disagrees Australia needs to join the rest of the developed world with a standard to ensure we get our fair share of new technology and choice of electric vehicles," said MTAA CEO Matt Hobbs.

"The whole industry knows putting in place a fuel efficiency standard is the right way to go. The argument is just about the fine details. We score the government a seven out of 10, so far. Some adjustments are needed in the early years, especially in the treatment of utes. I am confident we can work with the government to ensure they get a perfect mark."

MTAA's members are the largest providers of talent to the automotive industry. It's vital, as the government implements a fuel efficiency standard, that it partners with industry to get the workforce in place to support the EV transition.

"As stakeholders resolve EV supply and range issues in Australia, the next challenge is to implement the required workforce. EVs are cutting-edge technology and as such need a highly trained Australian workforce. A good first step is to make more apprentices eligible for the New Energy Apprentices Program," said Mr Hobbs.

MTAA is concerned not all car companies will make the transition. The huge technology shift brings opportunities but also risks for Australian small businesses and automotive workers who can lose their investment and livelihoods at the whim of international car companies in offshore headquarters.

Australian automotive workers and small businesses need the Albanese government to have their back in this period of change with an Automotive Industry Code of Conduct to protect workers who are at the mercy of multinational companies.

"The future of the global auto industry is the industrial version of the Hunger Games - played in boardrooms far from Australia. It is imperative the government develops an Automotive Industry Code to give Australian workers and businesses a fair go," said Mr Hobbs.

MTAA will shortly provide a detailed submission to the Federal Government on the impact of its preferred option.

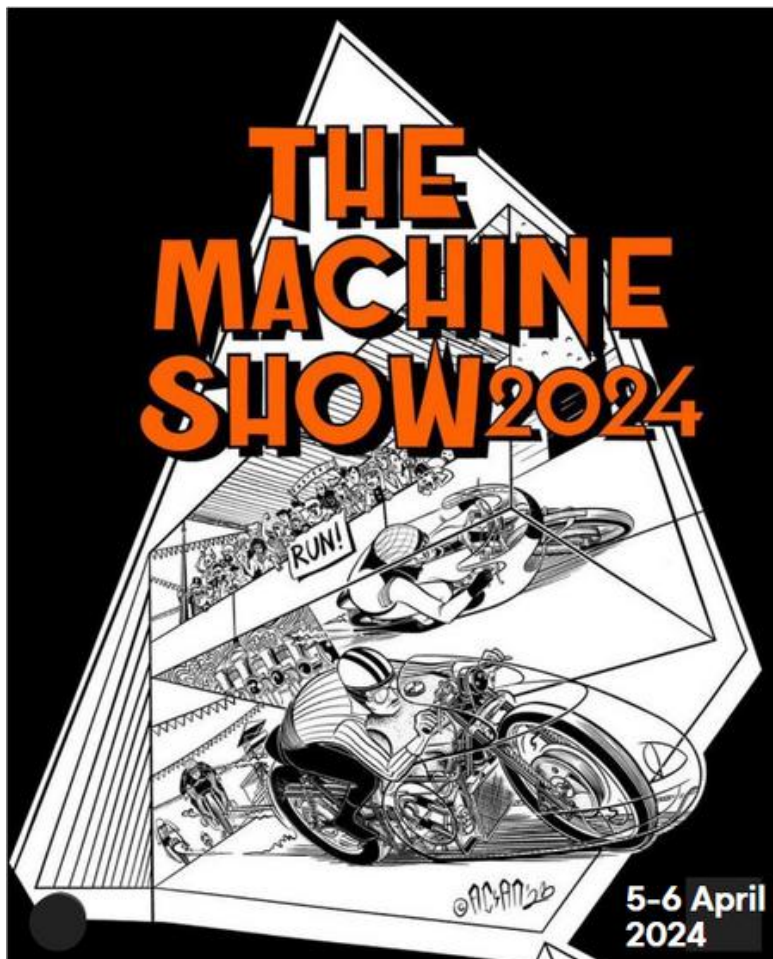

## Yoga pose of the week

with Christina Carroll



### Spinal Column Pose - Merudandasana

A pose to improve the sense of balance. It helps to elongates the spine, stimulating the abdominal organs and develops concentration and focus, which in turn calms and balances the mind.

**To practice** - Sit on the buttock with the knees bent and soles of the feet on the floor. Find a point in front of the body to fix the gaze. Take the arms inside the knees and grasp hold of the big toes, if not available the lower legs. Keep the spine straight and lean the body weight backwards slightly. Raise the feet off the floor and balance on the buttocks. Gradually straighten the legs and arms upwards. Separate the legs out to the sides and gaze softly at the steady point. Hold for as long as comfortable. To release, bring the legs together at the centre, bend the knees and lower the feet to the floor.

## RACING NEWS WITH THE JEMBAICUMBENE PUNTER

Or local trainers, the Clarke brothers head down the hill to the Sapphire Coast on Saturday. Luke saddled Devgru for Billy Owen in Race 1, Bega Freight Centre Plate over 1600 metres but did not score any money coming back in the field.

Aaron then saddled Kenseye Charmer for Richard Bensley and scored a third in Race 3 - Zim's Tiling Handicap over 1200 metres..

The exciting news for the week was Infatuation taking out Race 8 the Vale Bill Camer Handicap over 1350 metres with Zac Lloyd on board for the first time. Lloyd jumped her out quickly, created speed and led all the way. Her trainer Bjorn Baker promised her little daughter that he would give her \$50 if he got a winner on the day. He was very pleased to hand it over. To be honest Tommy Berry aboard Sailcoats were absolutely flying at her, thank heavens the post came when it did. They are now looking towards a bigger race at Flemington. Let us hope she can handle coming the opposite way. She will be entered for a Group 3, the Vanity for 3 year old fillies under set weights and penalty conditions. This race is on Saturday, 17th February.

Damien Oliver will make a brief return to race riding when he contests the International Jockeys Challenge in Saudi Arabia. He has been riding track work to keep fit. The 129 time Group One winner is to ride in at least for races at Riyadh, two on dirt and two on turf. He hopes to pick up more rides during the February 23 - 24 Carnival.

James McDonald didn't have a good day having to stand down after the Godolphin filly Celenty unloaded him and then performed badly in the Barrier and jammed his injured foot again. Celerity was eventually scratched.

JMac headed to Hong Kong on Sunday to ride Howdeepisyourlove for trainer John Size in the Hong Kong Classic Mile at Shan Tin. He rode in Hong Kong last month where he won on Voyage Bubble in the Group1 Stewards Cup. However, there was no joy in this race, finishing well back in the field.

Art Cadeau who was retired last month by trainer Terry Robinson has kicked off his career as a how Horse. He won a first for Off The Track Gelding and Reserve Champion at the Berry Show.

A Victorian jockey, Liam Riordan, will spend a month on the sideline after pleading guilty to causing another rider to fall at Camperdown meeting last month. Madison Lloyd fell from her mount Divine Turf on January 20th. He will return to the saddle on March 7th.

## Braidwood Indoor Fitness and Training Centre Update

Denver Shoemark reports:

Due to the complexity of the build we have had to make some changes to the construction method which meant we had to go back to have some engineering done. Good news is that has been sorted now which gave us some more flexibility in the final finish of the building which will keep it in keeping with the original concept drawings.

We are confident that we should be ready to start the build in March all going well and hopefully leading up to that will be able to post more frequently as things start to ramp up. We have been as frustrated as everyone waiting to get to this point as you would appreciate but are excited to be getting to this point of being finally able to start.

Vale Bill Camer - the former jockey passed away at the age of 92 last Saturday. He was born in Italy and started working as a newspaper delivery boy in Ayr, which is about an hour south of Townsville in Queensland. He was 14 and very small and rode a pony delivering the papers. A trainer's son saw him and asked if he would consider becoming a jockey. He and his parents moved to Townsville and eventually ended up in Randwick with trainer Pat Murray. He became one of Australia's best lightweight jockeys and was the oldest living Cox Plate jockey at the time of his passing, having taken out the Plate in 1954 on Kingster. Due to his lightweight he had a special saddle made for the Doncaster Handicap and Stradbroke winner Karendi which was carrying big weights. The saddle was made so the lead was built into it and you didn't have a lead bag rolling over the horse.

In the meantime, Punter's other share horse, Chicago King, is preparing for a jumpout in a few weeks. The other one, Happy Casino, is about to have his next couple of gallops and then step up his work to 14 seconds at the furlong. Sure takes these two a long time to reach the track.

Braidwood will come alive at the weekend when the Annual Races will be held. All roads lead to Braidwood Course on Saturday, 10th February.
