Impressive turnout in support of long day care

On Monday 4 March 2024, concerned parents and community members gathered at the Old Sunday School Hall to discuss their experiences and concerns regarding the lack of long day care in Braidwood following the recent sudden closure of the Purple House.

An impressive turnout speaks to the magnitude of our community's issue with eighty parents and community members, along with their children in attendance. Rebecca Ryan, General Manager of Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council (QPRC), Kenrick Winchester, Mayor QPRC, Councillors, Electorate Officers from the Offices of The Hon. Kristy McBain, Member for Eden-Monaro and The Hon Steve Whan, member for Monaro. The Braidwood and Villages Business Chamber and Braidwood Community Association were also in attendance.

Raw, honest, and powerful stories were shared by affected parents, detailing the negative and detrimental effects on the children who no longer have a school to attend, who have had their routine disrupted and do not understand why they aren't able to see their friends each day.

For our youngest in the community, their own home away from home and community suddenly disappeared. We heard about implications of the day care crisis in Braidwood for the workforce; highly trained, qualified and skilled professionals are unable to return to work, or have been forced to drop out of the workforce, and therefore unable to provide for the community. Essential services including education, health and emergency services are directly negatively impacted by the loss of access to childcare as these are often female dominated roles and these mothers are now unable to work. This leaves our community disadvantaged, particularly for our most vulnerable, our children.

A highly experienced and trained early childhood educator provided insight into research conducted that children who live rurally may already be disadvantaged due to their location, add to that the lack of access to early education, this can have huge ramifications for children moving forward through schooling years. 90% of brain development occurs in the first five years of life. Early childhood settings nurture children through these developmental years, developing physical health and wellbeing, social, cognitive, language and emotional skills, which harness children with the ability to utilise these skills throughout their schooling years.

It is well documented that the lack of affordable, available, and high-quality early childhood education and care has detrimental impacts on parents, children, the workforce and local economies and communities. We must act now to support our children by finding a solution to the lack of long day care in Braidwood!

The 'demand for day care in Braidwood' survey which was distributed last week was met with great participation. We received 77 responses, 92% of whom have 1-2 children under the age of 5yrs that requires care at an early childhood education centre, majority of those children are aged 0-3years and unable to be enrolled in a pre-school. Over 90% of parents identified that their children require care between the hours of 7:30am – 6:00pm.

Monday's facilitated discussion has been a reassuring step forward as a Working Group have been encouraging to seek support from QPRC, Bendigo Bank, Braidwood Pre-School, and the wider community as we work together to explore our options to find a solution for a fit-for-purpose early childhood education centre for children 0-5years which offers long day care in Braidwood.

A newly created Working Group has been established and our first meeting will be held next Monday 11 March at 4pm. In the meantime, we have met with Kristy McBain, Member for Eden-Monaro who has provided great support and offered advice for a solution which we will look into.

After 5 long years of fires, Covid and construction work, the Braidwood Show has returned. Watching the young ones running around, it was strange to think they had not been to one before.

The 144th Show included horse events, dog, sheep and alpaca displays as well as a packed pavilion of local produce, school artwork and handicraft. The CWA Showbags were a hit and sold out early. The BCS P & C bbq ran out of supplies and had to restock.

The children's races, gumboot throw, tug of war and Farm Team Challenge were keenly fought out.

In the afternoon there was a JSPD Martial Arts display, Chainsaw Racing, Curtis Bennett Wood Chopping display followed by the official 'turning on of the lights' and a demonstration polocrosse game.

Braidwood Show Woman of the Year Georgie had the honour of turning on the lights and there were speeches from Kristy McBain MP and Nick Fry from the Community Bank.

The Braidwood Showground 355 Committee has closed the Showground in August 2022 to begin the construction of the lights.

The \$1,140,228 project upgraded the electricity and installed lighting around arenas, cattle yards, toilets and main camping area.

The Committee said in 2022, "Since the beginning of 2019 until now a lot has happened in our community. Drought, fire and flood events have highlighted the usefulness of the showground as a large, versatile disaster evacuation centre for community personnel, their families and animals. Not to mention the community activities of Polocrosse, Campdrafting, Show, Pony Club, Mounted Games, Team Sorting, primitive camping for tourist visiting Braidwood or passing through, concerts, retreats, weddings, reunions and 21st birthdays."

Queanbeyan Palerang Regional Council worked with the Showground 355 committee and in 2021 the committee was successful with an application to the Crown Reserves Improvement Fund for \$977,833 to upgrade electricity and lighting requirements at the showground. This funding provided the catalyst to complete a Braidwood and Bungendore Community Bank Challenge Grant for \$222,131 which was successful, and the Braidwood 355 Showground User Groups committed the remaining \$65,614.

\$2 million in Federal funding netted for Bungendore Sports Hub

Netballers in Bungendore are on their toes and ready to 'bend and flick' plenty of goals – with the Albanese Labor Government delivering on its commitment to inject an additional \$2 million towards the next stages of the Bungendore Sports Hub.

Federal Member for Eden-Monaro, Kristy McBain was in Bungendore today to inspect progress on Stage 1 of the new sporting hub, and to outline new facilities that will take it to the next level.

These new funds are a welcome addition to the funding commitment from the NSW Government and the NSW Minister for regional NSW, Tara Moriarty.

With the \$2 million additional funding agreement now locked in with Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council, as part of the Albanese Government's Investing in our Communities Program, work can now commence on:

- **Construction of netball facilities**

New amenities block and storage

Fencing around courts stormwater drainage

- **Upgrades to Playing Fields**

Construction of 4 team dug outs

Seating units to seat at least 200 people

Installation of field goals

- **Upgrades to pavilion buildings**

Installation of solar panels and solar carpark lights

- **Upgrades to Carpark and access to playing fields**

Sealing of car park

Landscaping

Construction of pathways to access fields and netball courts

- **Preparation of Men's Shed site**

Levelling of site and installation of services and perimeter fencing.

This funding builds on \$565,000 already committed by the Australian Government under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, with the NSW Government committing \$3,550,000 and Council committing \$1,838,619.

The Bungendore Sports Hub project will deliver the Bungendore community much-needed regional sports facilities, with irrigated sports fields and netball courts – along with a new amenities block that will have four sets of change rooms with shower and toilet facilities, meeting/catering area, kiosk, toilets for spectators, storage rooms and officials' facilities.

Federal Member for Eden-Monaro, Kristy McBain MP said "It's so important that people of all ages have access to high-quality sporting facilities in their own backyard, which is why I strongly advocated for an additional \$2 million for this project, and why I'm thrilled to be delivering on this commitment for the Bungendore community.

"The Bungendore Sports Hub will be a real game-changer for this fast-growing community, and will mean that locals won't need to travel to Queanbeyan or the ACT for their training.

"The hub also presents an exciting future for Bungendore by putting it on the map to host carnivals and other community sporting events, which will help stimulate local small businesses."

NSW Minister for Regional NSW, the Hon Tara Moriarty MP said "Bungendore deserves quality sporting amenities close to home. Sports are incredibly important for this community, which is why we're funding this exciting upgrade of the Bungendore Sports Hub.

"These facilities will mean more locals can get involved in friendly sport or train for more serious competition – supporting the champions of tomorrow as well as healthy lifestyles and opportunities to meet new people and make new friends."

Member for Monaro, Steve Whan MP welcomed "this commitment of \$2,000,000 from the Federal Government towards the development of the new Bungendore Sports Hub. "Bungendore has a very popular and active netball club that has been hampered by a lack of local courts, it is fantastic news that there will now be local facilities for training and games."

"This boost in funding will help the community and council move forward with their plans to create a modern facility helping the people of Bungendore to stay active and healthy."



Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Mayor, Cr Kenrick Winchester added: "Our region is one of the fastest-growing areas in NSW and it is vital that we keep up with demand to supply facilities like the Bungendore Sports Hub. I thank the Australian and NSW governments for their financial support for this project, which I am delighted to see progressing at speed on the ground."

Consultation now open on Veterans' Legislation Reform

The Albanese Government has released exposure draft legislation which will simplify and harmonise the century old veterans' entitlements, compensation and rehabilitation system.

The current system is difficult to understand and complex to administer. The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide found the system was "so complicated that it adversely affects the mental health of some veterans and can be a contributing factor to suicidality."

Following consultation, the draft legislation will simplify the veteran compensation system, with all claims to be considered under a single Act. Under the new system:

- All new claims for compensation and rehabilitation from the date of commencement would be assessed under a single Act, an improved Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act (MRCA);
- The Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986 and the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation (Defence-related Claims) Act 1988 would be closed to new claims following commencement of the new arrangements;
- All benefits being received under existing schemes will continue unaffected under grand-parenting arrangements. Any new claims after the commencement date (including claims for worsening of pre-existing conditions) will be assessed under the improved MRCA.

There will also be a number of improvements including:

- introduction of a new Additional Disablement Amount to provide similar benefits as the Extreme Disablement Adjustment for those post retirement age;
- making the higher travel allowance under MRCA available to all veterans and for all kilometres travelled;
- providing a pathway for veterans currently only covered by DRCA to qualify for the Specialist Medical Review Council and a Gold Card if they have a new claim accepted and
- increasing the general funeral allowance to \$3,000 with the amount previously set at \$2,000.

The release of draft legislation follows the Government's earlier consultation on a pathway to simplify the veterans' legislative framework, and provide better support to veterans and their families. Feedback from that consultation has guided the proposed changes announced today.

I welcome feedback and submissions from the veteran community and general public on the draft Veterans' Entitlements, Treatment and Support (Simplification and Harmonisation) Bill 2024, submissions close on 28 April 2024.

Milestone reached in doubling Landcare funding

The NSW Government has today reached another milestone in its election commitment to double the funding for Landcare in NSW, with an investment of \$8.2 million being delivered.

During the state election the NSW Government committed to providing \$59 million in funding over the next four years ensure Landcare can expand and continue its vital work rehabilitating the state's natural environment.

The \$8.2 million announced today will be used by Landcare NSW to:

- Fund the employment of up to 7.5 full-time equivalent staff to provide centralised support to host organisations and coordinators funded through the Program.
- Establish a Shared Services Hub that provides centralised support to host organisations and coordinators funded under the Local and Regional Coordinators Grants across a range of business services, but specifically administration and human resources.
- Implement and manage a state Community of Practice including Landcare state gatherings, conferences and regional events.
- Implement and manage a Digital Landcare solution to improve reporting processes and knowledge sharing for program participants.
- Develop and maintain strategic partnerships and leverage investment, to increase Landcare's self-sustenance and reduce reliance on direct NSW Government funding over the medium to longer term.

Agriculture Minister Tara Moriarty said "This funding to Landcare NSW will support host organisations, coordinators and support roles that will enable this program to achieve essential environmental and agricultural productivity outcomes over the next four years.

"Landcarers, primary producers and the environment will all benefit from this funding to Landcare NSW, as coordinators and Landcare groups will have more capacity to support the delivery of on-ground projects.

"A key part of the funding will allow Landcare NSW to increase its self-sustenance and reduce reliance on direct NSW Government funding over the medium to longer term.

"I am very passionate about Landcare and the important role they play in protecting the environment, and supporting agricultural productivity in our communities so it gives me great pleasure to announce this funding."

Landcare NSW CEO Turlough Guerin said "We welcome this announcement of funding from the NSW Government and thank Minister Tara Moriarty for her ongoing support and commitment to Landcare.

"This funding will allow the local and regional coordinators and support staff to receive the support they need to excel in their roles and deliver for the communities they are working in."

Bunker insurance ready for next bush fire season

David Aitken and Anne Eastman have recently installed a bushfire bunker at their property on the edge of Moruya. Living on the edge of the town, the couple are all too aware of the risks of future fires and the speed with which it could come after the Black Summer fires.

David, an architect, said "It was a local artist Ken Tabor in Maulbrooks Road who convinced me recently to get one. He survived in his own built shelter when the Mogo Fire swept through in 2019. His whole forested property, car and house went up in flames ... he would never have been able to escape by foot or car!"

"He convinced me finally that we were stupid not to put a shelter in," said David.

The shelter's location carefully selected and excavated using a timber profile as a visual guide. It has been built in with extra granite boulders and covered by a curved metal roof. The shelter unit was prefabricated in Albury.

Special Features include:

- Durable design made from 40MPA reinforced concrete with a 100mm wall thickness.
- Double plated, insulated steel door comes fitted with a fire window allowing the occupants to see what is going on outside and know when it is safe to leave.

- The door is fitted with the highest quality industrial thermal seals available and 1400°C x 50mm thick Fire Blanket inside the door.
- Bunker is lockable, although also includes an internal safety latch for extra safety – Occupants cannot be locked inside!
- Units can be freestanding or ideally buried or submerged into an embankment.
- Fits up to 6 adults (pets too!) for a period of two hours. In most cases, you should only need to be inside for 15-20 minutes. Approx 8 cubic meters.
- Comes with a concrete base.
- Designed for easy unloading with a tray truck and hiab crane. Bunker has lifting lugs that allow it to be positioned.
- Tapered roof line allowing water run off.
- New Heavy Duty Container Door hinges are used with brass bearings (no plastic).
- Double glazed fire window.

The advantage to this bunker is that there is no climbing down or crawling into. It allows easy and safe access for all ages and their four legged furry friends to walk in and out.

The bunker would be safe for the couple for around 4 hours.

Update on a new Landcare Nursery Network for Braidswood and the Region

The Upper Shoalhaven Landcare Council received a grant from the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife's Bushfire Recovery program to establish a community nursery in our region, and produce 10,000 seedlings to be in the ground by May 2025.

We are currently establishing a Landcare Nursery Network where a range of people from across the district can work together to grow biodiverse local and climate ready seedlings at home.

While we hope to find the perfect location for a 'bricks and mortar' fully functioning nursery, we will start off with a couple of local 'hubs' where we store supplies such as seed, soil, potting mix, trays, tubes, shade cloth etc. We are initially aiming to establish a hub in Araluen, one in Mongarlowe, and one in Braidswood. As well as being a place where people from the new Landcare Community Nursery network and anyone else can come along to training days, help pot up seedlings, build a shade house or just make the hubs welcoming and nice.

We will soon employ a coordinator to take on the task of tracking all the seed, the growers, the success rates and all joyful task of matching growers with people who have tree planting projects planned. Trees will be sold at a very subsidised rate for the first 10,000. Income from the sales will go towards paying a local coordinator (or two) to continue the project.

Our network already has the expertise of a number of local botanists, horticulturalists, land managers, environmental scientists and other enthusiastic and interested locals who are keen to learn the art of raising biodiverse local seedlings and being part of a network that aims to increase the resilience of local biodiversity and habitat to the predicted changing climate.

\$300 million investment in TAFE NSW

From welders at Wagga Wagga, to tractors at Wollongbar and Goulburn, and forklifts at Nirimba, and Albury, the funding will deliver new equipment to support the continued delivery of industry-aligned training to learners.

In addition to maintenance work and new teaching equipment, the investment also provides more than \$36 million for over 8,500 new digital devices and directs funding into improved digital connectivity at 28 regional campuses across the state.

The investment in digital connectivity is a particularly major win for regional communities and will be used to overhaul outdated network infrastructure, improve Wi-Fi connectivity, and build cyber security resilience, which is critical for effective teaching and learning in the 21st century.

The funding will also ensure the completion of the redevelopment of TAFE NSW Kingscliff and the upgrade of TAFE NSW Coffs Harbour, ensuring a pipeline of more skilled workers in these booming regional communities.

Northern NSW can expect more demand for skilled healthcare, hospitality, and construction workers over the next three years. This investment ensures TAFE NSW is well-placed to meet the educational and employment needs of such communities.

This investment reflects the NSW Government's commitment to place TAFE NSW at the heart of the vocational and education training system.

Minister for Skills, TAFE and Tertiary Education, Steve Whan said: "This critical \$300 million investment will rebuild the physical and digital infrastructure at 120 TAFE NSW campuses neglected for a decade by the previous Liberal-National Government.

"When I became Minister for TAFE, I was alarmed to get letters from students at TAFE colleges in country NSW telling me they were using their own phones to get internet connectivity on their campuses – because the Wi-Fi was so out of date.

"Stories about neglected classrooms don't help to attract the people we need to see taking on training or teaching. NSW Labor is doing something about it.

"In Wagga Wagga, this investment will mean \$600,000 to deliver upgraded fabrication and welding facilities and equipment, ensuring apprentices working on major projects like Inland Rail, or maintaining local bridges across the Riverina are set up for success.

"We'll also spend \$500,000 to replace 164 digital devices, and \$550,000 for a new Aboriginal Cultural safe space at Wagga Wagga TAFE.

"TAFE NSW offers learners a great experience, but we don't want it diminished by facilities that should have been maintained properly by the last government. And now it won't be.

"This investment adds to the NSW Labor Government's \$3.8 billion investment in the skills and training sector, made together with the Commonwealth Government.

"Employers are relying on TAFE NSW to equip learners with in-demand skills using industry-standard equipment and technology, ensuring they graduate job-ready.

"This announcement will ensure the right skills mix to drive jobs, opportunity and productivity in NSW.

"The continued investment in TAFE NSW's infrastructure will expand learning opportunities in local communities, improve educational outcomes, and support the state's critical skills needs."

The business of paying for news - Meta pulls out of News Media Bargaining Code

Last Friday, **Meta**, the owner of Facebook, announced that "In early April 2024, we will deprecate Facebook News – a dedicated tab in the bookmarks section on Facebook that spotlights news – in the US and Australia. This follows our September 2023 announcement that we deprecated Facebook News in the UK, France and Germany last year." "People will still be able to view news on Facebook in feed in these countries, and publishers will continue to have access to their Facebook accounts and Pages, where they can post their news article links and content.

This update does not otherwise impact the existing agreements we have in relation to Facebook News with news publishers in Australia, France and Germany until they expire."

Meta said "This is part of an ongoing effort to better align our investments to our products and services people value the most. As a company, we have to focus our time and resources on things people tell us they want to see more of on the platform, including short form video. The number of people using Facebook News in Australia and the U.S. has dropped by over 80% last year. We know that people don't come to Facebook for news and political content – they come to connect with people and discover new opportunities, passions and interests. As we previously shared in 2023, news makes up less than 3% of what people around the world see in their Facebook feed, and is a small part of the Facebook experience for the vast majority of people.

"This does not impact our commitment to connecting people to reliable information on our platforms. We work with third-party fact-checkers – certified through accreditation bodies like the non-partisan International Fact-Checking Network – who review and rate viral misinformation on our apps. We have built the largest global fact-checking network of any platform by partnering with more than 90 independent fact-checking organizations around the world who review content in more than 60 languages. We have contributed more than \$150 million to programs supporting our fact-checking efforts since 2016 to combat the spread of misinformation and we will continue to invest in this area."

In response a joint media release from **Michelle Rowland MP Minister for Communications and Stephen Jones MP**, Assistant Treasurer and Minister for Financial Services

said: "Meta's decision to no longer pay for news content in a number of jurisdictions represents a dereliction of its commitment to the sustainability of Australian news media. The Government has made its expectations clear.

The decision removes a significant source of revenue for Australian news media businesses. Australian news publishers deserve fair compensation for the content they provide.

The Australian Government is committed to the News Media Bargaining Code and is seeking advice from Treasury and the ACCC on next steps.

We will now work through all available options under the News Media Bargaining Code. The Government will continue to engage with news publishers and platforms through this process.

The Albanese Government is committed to promoting a strong, sustainable and diverse media sector given its vital importance to our democracy and social cohesion."

The **Public Interest Journalism Initiative (PIJI)** issued a statement saying "today's news that Meta will not renew any of their commercial agreements with Australian news organisations.

While not unexpected, this confirmation represents a major blow to the production of public interest news in this country and a loss of millions of dollars to the sector."

"Public interest news production in Australia needs long-term structural reform, as well as immediate attention," explains PIJI CEO Anna Draffin.

"A series of sequential and overlapping shocks have hit this sector, including the decline of the business model (accelerated during the pandemic), the advent of generative AI and now Meta not renewing Australian commercial agreements with news organisations.

"These shocks can be seen in newsroom closures, declines in news producers' earnings, as well as declines in advertising spend.

"A democracy cannot function without a healthy news sector. We know this is a priority for government and it must be addressed as a matter of urgency.

"PIJI is actively engaging with government, industry and the community through initiatives such as the government's News Media Assistance Program (News MAP) to find viable, evidence-based, long-term solutions, but clearly in the meantime there is the need for immediate support."

Paul Fletcher MP, Communications Minister when the Morrison Government stared down Meta with the News Media Bargaining Code in 2021, asked "Can the Albanese Government do the same, after Meta today once again showed its disregard for Australia's laws?

The announcement by Facebook's parent company Meta that it does not intend to renew agreements made under the News Media Bargaining Code is a demonstration of its disregard for the laws of Australia.

Meta took that step to try to force the then Liberal National Government into backing down from our stated policy intention of introducing the News Media Bargaining Code.

The rationale for the Code was to deal with a competition policy problem. Because of its market power, Facebook was able to take content generated and paid for by Australian news media businesses – such as a two minute clip from National Nine News, or a story in the Herald Sun – to attract audiences, and to generate advertising revenue from those audiences, without paying for that content. Facebook's attempt to make us back down did not succeed. We legislated the Code in early 2021 and it had the desired effect. Between February 2021 and February 2022 Meta entered into commercial deals with some 11 Australian news media businesses (and Google with 19.) According to independent estimates, some \$200 million will flow to Australian news media businesses under deals entered into by Meta and Google."

It is now up to the current Government to use those powers. For example, under the Code the Treasurer of the day has the power to 'designate' Meta – and once it is designated Meta can be required to participate in compulsory arbitration with registered news media businesses."

"I hope that the current Government will show the same resolve in staring down the digital platforms that the previous Government successfully showed" said Mr Fletcher.

How will this affect you? Actually, I had to search for the news tab in Facebook. I'm not sure I've seen it before. However, the money paid by Meta from the News Bargaining code did go to help journalism, particularly in the regions where the ABC used the Meta funds to create 60 new regional jobs, including two on the south coast.

The Code mainly benefited the big media forms with little filter down to local news operations.



Passive Land Hydration pt 4 Abatement Swale

If you've spent any time looking out the window of a moving car you are probably very familiar with abatement swales, although you might not know it. They are very similar to Contour Trenches (as discussed last week ed 194) with one significant difference.

There are plenty of examples in our area. The most visible being at the Doughboy overtaking lanes on the Kings Hwy. On both sides of the road, abatement swales can be seen. They wind across the landscape like dirt snakes catching runoff. They assist the filling of dams in dry times and guide overflows to less fragile areas of the paddock, just like contour trenches and Yeomans furrows.

The grass colonised the mound decades ago, and reeds are evident in the low points of the structure. There is some habitat as described last week, so I was excited when I first saw these structures in the landscape.

How did they get there?

Abatement swales were installed in the 1970s, maybe earlier, to protect the Welcome Reef Dam area. They were created to remedy erosion. Significant rain events were damaging paddocks and waterways. Runoff was taking a lot of earth with it after crossing distressed landscapes and dumping it in the Shoalhaven River. Something had to be done.

Stopping the water at the top of the system is paramount to reducing its power. A series of structures slowing the flow is the key to keeping topsoil in your paddock, be it rocks, logs or trenches. The abatement swales have done a good job of reducing erosion, but they have missed an opportunity. One key function.

Abatement swales are constructed with a 5% fall, as opposed to contour trenches that have 0% fall. This means that abatement swales are more accurately abatement drains. The trenches are filled only when the water is running, akin to a seasonal creek. When the rain event halts so do the full trenches.

As we have learnt, the limiting factor for water soakage is the time it spends in contact with the earth. The 5% fall means that the water will slowly but surely drain away. An abatement swale does a good job at draining without damage but is missing a key component for soil health in paddocks.

Remedy

The soaking benefit of standing water is the best way to improve your soil moisture. Hydration is the key to soil life and productivity. The abatement drains have provided a noble service in the face of erosion, and some minor tweaks to the structure can reap even more benefits.

You could get machines in to modify the trench for a significant change, or you could use simple techniques to a lesser effect. The idea is to create small weirs in the trench. To hold water back before overflowing down the drain and into the next section.

A weir every 10-20m down the abatement swale would hold water for soaking in sections along the structure. Not the same capacity as a true contour trench, but enough to improve your paddock.

If a machine was on hand, the trench could be cleaned out on contour and the spoils used to create a weir downstream. This would take some management while grasses re-grow, with specific attention paid to the weir during and after rain events. Perhaps it would be best to scrape the trench intermittently down the line, so some vegetation is still present in the system providing some hydraulic roughness.

A simple way to build a weir would be to use stones from the paddock. Sediment will get caught up in the grass and stones. Initially creating a leaky weir and as time goes on, the weir will become impervious, holding more water for longer.

Best use

When the land gets steep, a contour trench can fail under the pressure of the standing water. On steeper land, more loose material in the downhill mound, will come under pressure. On shallow land the trench does most of the work holding back the water.

Sepp Holzer is famed for growing in the Austrian alps, on steep country. He specialises in projects from 1000m to 1500m above sea level. His use of modified abatement swales has brought him great success over the past 70 years, in conjunction with other harvesting systems.

An advocate of the 'pay attention: copy nature' philosophy, first coined by his country man Viktor Schauberger at the end of the 19th century. Holzer has created productive polyculture farms where most folks wouldn't bother, opening up marginal country to regenerative agriculture.

He raises animals, grass, fruit and vegetables in the wild. He creates productive vegetable garden and orchard systems that thrive in extreme conditions. The growing season for Sepp is typically less than 90 days between frosts/snow. A much more challenging environment than Braidwood, Canberra or Goulburn. He managed these feats using trial and error and rejecting accepted practices, all the time being led by natural systems. Food for thought.

This week

In addition to the trees changing colour, Currawongs are another great indicator of the onset of the cold season. They have just changed their call, signalling the start of their departure. Have you noticed? It's time for them to move on for winter and they are telling anyone who will listen.

The Currawong is traditionally a migrant and likes to leave for a warmer climate when it gets cold in the hills or tablelands. Interestingly, evidence is building in cities and towns along the Great Dividing Range, where Currawongs are resisting the urge to migrate because they have an abundance of food, and the human habitat is warm enough in winter.

The next wave of sauce tomatoes has been harvested and there is way more than the rats and birds can eat. This bounty means its Passata time. Getting an efficient setup takes experience and it evolves every season. Where are all the items I need? I haven't seen some of these things for a year. More likely, they have been used for other duties, so the setup gets an upgrade.

It's been a great growing season this summer, regardless of the cooler temperatures. I'm grateful I didn't have to hand water the garden. The load of produce to store will max out our modest space. There is more than we can possibly eat, so the chickens get to feast too.

The contribution from the flock is always appreciated, so they get the best tucker to fuel their work. Sure, they provide eggs and entertainment, but I'm in it for the scratching and the poop.

Remember, every day is a school day. Stay awesome.

Biotech Nexus Lab to target bovine breakthroughs

University of Queensland

Connection is key for the new Associate Professor in Animal Biotechnology at the Queensland Alliance for Agriculture and Food Innovation (QAAFI).

Associate Professor Sheila Ommeh plans to establish the Biotech Nexus Lab at QAAFI and the first target of her research is pestivirus, a virus endemic in Australian cattle.

"Nexus is a very important word because it means connections, and I thought starting my research in Australia, it would be good to look at connections," Dr Ommeh said.

"I want to find out why pestivirus is endemic and why it is not being eradicated.

"I also want to complement the research already underway at QAAFI and to collaborate with the world class researchers here as a colleague rather than a competitor and that is why I have chosen pestivirus."

Pestivirus or bovine viral diarrhoea virus (BVDV) is highly contagious and can cause diarrhoea, early term abortion, loss of condition, reduced reproductive performance and respiratory disease in cattle.

Dr Ommeh said she will consider the connections pestivirus may have with other diseases.

"My previous research with the International Livestock Research Institute on Newcastle disease in poultry for example has shown that eradicating the virus will not be the panacea, as it won't be the only infection present," she said.

"I want to see what the most common coinfections in cattle are, because pestivirus often goes unnoticed even though it's endemic in Australian cattle.

"It often occurs as a coinfection with Bovine Respiratory disease."

And she has lofty goals for the new laboratory and the team she plans to create, starting with the recruitment of a post-doc researcher in the next month.

"In five years I want to have a very clear molecular assay for pestivirus in cattle in Queensland and beyond," Dr Ommeh said.

"Something simple that doesn't compromise on specifics or sensitivity.

"And that should be leading to other diagnostic assays in other livestock as well as the development of vaccines.

"It's all connected."



Be on the lookout for Three Day Sickness

Local Land Services

Bovine Ephemeral Fever (BEF), commonly known as Three Day Sickness, has been confirmed by laboratory testing in cattle in the Shoalhaven with likelihood to spread throughout the South East region. The virus, transmitted by mosquitoes, induces high fever and muscle/joint pain in affected cattle.

District Veterinarian Mark Doyle attributes the cases due to BEF being detected in the North Coast region in November 2023, spreading to the Hunter and progressing south. Recent wet weather also creates ideal conditions for an increase of mosquitoes.

"Once bitten by an insect carrying the virus, symptoms of Three Day Sickness progress rapidly," Mark said.

"Aside from the fever, animals can appear depressed, lethargic, reluctant to eat and appear lame, may drool, shiver and be stiff."

"Cattle that have been previously exposed will develop an immunity to the disease and not be affected."

"Some cattle, especially heavier cattle, bulls and pregnant breeders may go down and take several days to get back on their feet. They are more likely to need extra care to avoid secondary complications."

"The high fever can cause prolonged infertility in bulls and abortion in breeders."

"Anti-inflammatory medication is highly effective in reducing the fever and lessening the muscle and joint pain, improving recovery timeframes, and resulting in less weight loss."

"Given the similarity of symptoms with other diseases, veterinary diagnosis is recommended."

Affected cattle should be provided with shade, water and feed and turned or lifted twice daily to help prevent secondary complications. A paddock free of steep hills or gullies is preferable.

Recently recovered cattle should not be sent to the abattoirs for several weeks to give the body a chance to heal and avoid the possibility of downgrades from any residual muscle damage. Where treatments have been given, any meat/milk withholding periods must be observed.

A vaccine is available, and producers can consider vaccinating stock. The vaccine requires two doses 2-4 weeks apart, if previously unvaccinated, and then a booster every 12 months for ongoing protection. Where the virus is already present, vaccinating now is unlikely to provide protection in time, however these are the first cases seen in the area this season, so there may still be time to vaccinate especially for high value and heavy animals.
