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QPRC MAYOR'S COLUMN

Tomorrow (Thursday 25 April) I will be attending the Braidwood Dawn Service at 6am and the Majors Creek Service at 8am to commemorate Anzac Day. Thank you to the community members who organise these events to help us honour all Australians and New Zealanders who served and died to protect our country.

Last week I had the honour of opening our new Heritage Library in the old Council Chambers on Crawford Street in Queanbeyan. The local heritage collection includes archives from local newspapers, genealogy records, historical resources, books written on the history of Braidwood, Bungendore, Queanbeyan, and surrounding areas as well as maps, village plans and other council documents from the former shires of our region. This is an exciting new chapter for the history of our region, and I couldn't think of a better home for this significant collection than this building. Thank you to everyone involved in making this space possible. The Heritage Library will be open to the public Tuesday to Thursday 10am to 4pm and at other times by appointment. As part of the Regional and National Heritage Festival the new facility will have an Open Day on Saturday May 11 offering opportunities for archive tours and history talks, as well as heritage building advice from Philip Leeson Architects — Council's newly appointed Heritage Advisors.

Following the 2023 Boxing Day flood event the Stoney Creek Bridge was damaged and required repair. The bridge was further damaged over the weekend of 5-7 April and has been closed until repairs are completed. Work is underway Monday to Friday, 7am to 4pm and expected to be completed by Thursday 2 May 2024. A detour is in place along Kain Cross Road/Jerrabattgulla Road. Local vehicles, including semi-trailers, will be allowed to use this road to ensure cattle trucks can still make sales. B-Doubles will not be accepted on these roads. To ensure safety of other vehicles, a pilot vehicle can be arranged by contacting Council.

The bus service has made arrangements for students and community members should liaise with Braidwood Buses for details on this arrangement. Council and contractors will be undertaking works on detour roads to improve road conditions following the wet weather on 5-7 April. Council also plans to improve site lines by controlling vegetation on this detour. The emergency repairs of the abutments on Stoney Creek Bridge are being funded under the Disaster Relief Funding Arrangements (DRFA).

We're holding a community meeting in Braidwood on Thursday 16 May from 6pm to 8pm at the Braidwood Servicemans Club. These meetings are an opportunity to meet and chat with councillors and staff, learn about local projects and services, and ask questions about issues that matter to you. Decisions from the April 24th Ordinary Meeting of QPRC

QPRC decisions from the 24 April Ordinary Council Meeting.

Check the livestream available at the website.

- Council approves the Leave of Absence application submitted by Cr Michele Biscotti for the 22 May 2024 Council Meeting.
- Council is now hearing from nine members of the public who are making presentations about items on tonight's agenda.
- Council acknowledges the community interest in the DA to construct a registered club at 37 Tompsitt Drive, Jerrabomberra and will make a submission to the Regional Planning Panel to request a public determination meeting.
- Council notes the <http://change.org> petition for a pedestrian crossing in the school precinct on Kings Highway, Bungendore and will write to the Member for Monaro and NSW Minister for Transport with Council's support for investigation and necessary work.
- Council notes disbanding of the Captains Flat Lead Taskforce, that there is currently no coordinating group, that residents have requested to be involved in implementation of lead abatement actions 1/2
- 2/2 Notes that Council requires funding to remediate public and Crown Land, that residents require a viable option to dispose of contaminated soil. Will hold a workshop with councillors to discuss these matters.
- Council will establish a lead management working group with representatives from Council and the community and will write to the NSW Premier to request involvement from the NSW Government in the working group.
- Council will provide a letter of support for the finalisation of the Draft South Jerrabomberra Regional Job Precinct Master Plan and associated amendments to the Queanbeyan-Palerang Local Environmental Plan 2022.

- Council supports the progression of a scoping proposal at 138 Environa Drive, Environa for initial agency consultation, noting that this is not approval or endorsement of the scoping proposal and will consider this at a future date.
- Council will support the progression of a scoping proposal at 3 Callum St and 76 Tharwa Rd, Queanbeyan for initial agency consultation, noting that this is not approval or endorsement of the scoping proposal and will consider this at a future date.
- Council endorses David Madew Oval as the location for the Jerrabomberra Pump Track and will proceed to final design, with report to be brought back to Council before construction.
- Council will place the Bungendore Place Plan on public exhibition for 28 days at <https://yourvoice.qprc.nsw.gov.au>
- Council will place the QPRC Sporting Gallery Policy on public exhibition for 28 days at <https://yourvoice.qprc.nsw.gov.au>

Protect yourself and your community this flu season

People across NSW are being urged to protect themselves against serious illness by booking in for their influenza vaccine ahead of the 2024 flu season.

The latest respiratory surveillance report shows more than 4,700 people in NSW were diagnosed with influenza in the last four weeks, a 16 per cent increase compared with the previous year. NSW hospitals received 480 influenza-like illness admissions between the 6 January and 14 April 2024. This is compared with 284 during the same period in 2023.

The NSW Government is encouraging people to book in for the influenza vaccine through a local GP or pharmacist ahead of winter.

People who are considered to be at higher risk of severe illness from influenza are eligible for a free flu vaccine. Priority groups include:

- Children aged 6 months to under five years
- People aged 65 and over
- Aboriginal people from 6 months of age
- Pregnant women
- Those with serious health conditions such as diabetes, cancer, immune disorders, obesity, severe asthma, kidney, heart, lung or liver disease.

NSW Health also recommends considering getting a COVID-19 booster at the same time as the flu vaccination.

The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation's latest COVID-19 vaccine advice recommends:

- a COVID-19 vaccination every six months for all adults aged 75 years and over,
- a COVID-19 vaccination every 12 months for adults aged 65 – 74 years, and adults aged 18 – 64 with severe immunocompromise; these people can consider a vaccination every 6 months,
- a COVID-19 vaccination every 12 months can be considered for all other adults aged 18 – 64 years, and those aged 5 – 18 years with severe immunocompromise.

Some steps to help protect ourselves and our loved ones from COVID-19 and flu include:

- Stay up to date with recommended influenza and COVID-19 vaccinations.
- Stay home if you have cold or flu symptoms and wear a mask if you need to leave home.
- Gather outdoors or in well-ventilated indoor spaces.
- Talk with your doctor now if you are at higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19 or influenza to make a plan about what to do if you get sick, including what test to take, and discussing if you are eligible for antiviral medicines.
- Don't visit people who are at higher risk of severe illness if you have cold or flu symptoms or have tested positive to COVID-19 or influenza.
- Consider taking a rapid antigen test before visiting vulnerable loved ones, particularly when COVID-19 transmission is moderate or high in the community.

Fresh focus for our regions

The NSW Government has today announced changes to the way the Government will serve regional communities, with an enhanced focus on protecting biosecurity, supporting agriculture, fisheries, forestry and mining as well as broader regional development.

From 1 July, 2024, the Department of Regional NSW will be re-named the NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development. This reflects the twin objectives of growing our primary industries through greater focus on extension services, research and development and supporting regional economic development.

As part of the renewed focus there will also be a change in leadership of the new department.

Rebecca Fox will depart the role of Secretary after almost a decade serving the community in various senior roles in NSW Government. This included guiding the Department of Regional NSW through a period of consolidation and increased focus on delivery for regional communities and primary industries.

The incoming Secretary will be current Chief Executive Officer Local Land Services, Steve Orr, who has had a long and accomplished career serving the community in leadership roles in regional coordination and development, primary industries and local government.

These changes will create two new divisions within the Department, each with Deputy Secretaries reporting directly to the Secretary.

Agriculture and Biosecurity will be grouped to support the delivery of the Independent Commissioners for Agriculture and Biosecurity and reflects the interrelationship between the protection and productivity of our primary industries sector and the environment.

Fisheries and Forestry will also be combined to reflect the common natural resource management issues and the need for the long-term sustainable management and productivity of our state's fisheries, marine estate and forests.

Regional economic development focused on regional industries and employment will remain firmly rooted in the new department, with broader Regional Coordination functions returning to the NSW Premier's Department. The return of Regional Coordination to the Premier's Department emphasises the Premier and the Minister's commitment to whole-of-government coordination for regional communities.

Regional Coordination teams will remain based in their current six regions ensuring the voices and needs of regional communities are at the centre of both government and the NSW public service.

These teams will continue to work with all government agencies, local councils, community and industry partners to coordinate and drive major projects and to address some of the longer-term, complex issues affecting regional communities.

NSW Government rolls out 2,700 new mobile speed camera enforcement sites

The NSW Government is doubling roadside enforcement sites used for mobile speed cameras and unveiling more measures to counter the rising number of deaths on our roads, with actions at state and federal level.

There will be no increase in mobile speed camera enforcement hours, but cameras will be able to be deployed in 2,700 new sites across the state to reduce speeding more widely across the network.

The number of enforcement hours will remain at around 21,000 hours per month across NSW regardless of the new sites where cameras can operate.

The expansion is necessary in response to the increase in fatalities post-COVID. So far in 2024, 109 people have lost their lives on NSW roads - 13 higher than the same point in 2023.

New enforcement sites, which will be scoped over the next 12 months, are the latest road safety measure introduced by the NSW Labor Government, including:

- Removing a loophole to force all motorists driving on a foreign licence to convert to a NSW licence within six months
- The introduction of seatbelt enforcement by existing mobile phone detection cameras commencing on July 1
- The demerit point trial that earlier this month saw 1.1 million drivers get a demerit point wiped from their licence for maintaining a spotless record over 12 months
- Hosting the state's first road safety forum, bringing together more than 150 local and international experts

The NSW Government today announces the actions that have been taken out of the February Road Safety Forum, with Transport for NSW to immediately begin work on:

- Partnering with up to ten regional councils to fast-track the implementation of safer speed limits, particularly in areas of high pedestrian activity
- A new look road safety communications strategy aimed at, and designed with, young people
- Reviewing up to 35 school precincts across the state for improved safety on key routes to school

• Supporting safer speeds through better lighting, placemaking and streetscape improvements for areas that have, or are introducing, permanent 40kmh and 30kmh speed zones

On Friday, NSW is joining other states at the Road Safety Ministers' Meeting hosted by the Australian Government in Melbourne.

NSW has joined national and state road agencies in the signing of a formal data-sharing agreement which will help form a clearer picture of road safety across Australia, and inform strategies designed to increase safety.

Data around the causes of crashes, including speeding, fatigue and seatbelt-use, crash locations, speed limits and types of vehicles involved will all be shared to help design initiatives to lower road trauma nation-wide.

The National Road Safety Data Agreement will extend data sharing to state jurisdictions and non-government researchers, meaning the NSW Government will now be able to utilise information from across the country.

Highlighting the importance of using data to develop road safety strategies, Transport will today launch the Towards Zero Collaboration Hub, consolidating road safety information, data access and resources into a single, accessible platform.

The Hub will build road safety knowledge and empower local councils, community organisations and other road safety stakeholders to work together and share strategies to help prevent deaths and serious injuries on our roads. Following the NSW Road Safety Forum, Transport will also explore ways with Corrective Services to enhance behaviour change programs for high-risk drink and drug driving offenders, and to implement stronger post-crash drug and alcohol testing after serious crashes.

Transport for NSW will also examine the benefits and challenges of using average speed cameras to enforce speeding for light vehicles.

Minister for Roads John Graham said "Reducing the predictability of where roadside cameras are set up was recommended by the NSW Auditor-General."

"Like all other states around Australia, NSW has experienced an unwelcome rise in road fatalities since the COVID era, and we're taking action to prevent these tragedies on the road.

"The Road Safety Forum was an extremely valuable opportunity to draw on the expertise and experience of over 150 international and Australian experts and the NSW Government is committed to building upon its recommendations.

"Finalising the National Road Safety Data Sharing Agreement will help form a clearer picture of vital information such as upgrades to roads and driver behaviour trends across Australia, as we work toward lowering road trauma nation-wide."

Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Jenny Aitchison said "The rollout of 2,700 new mobile speed camera enforcement sites across NSW will predominantly occur in regional NSW where 1,650 new sites will be eligible once the scoping period is completed over the coming 12 months.

"This is entirely appropriate considering regional NSW represents a third of the NSW population but two-thirds of deaths on our roads."

Light up Christmas!

The BAVBC recently invited representatives of QPRC to discuss how we could bring the Christmas spirit (not to mention the Christmas lights) back to Braidwood and district. The council told us that the responses to its Christmas survey were overwhelmingly in favour of the Christmas party returning to Ryrie Park and for the late night shopping event to be on a separate night. While those who took part in, and who helped to organise, last year's event did a great job, the council made apologies for the lack of lights and funding last year. This year the funding will be almost doubled at \$25,000 and will go towards new Christmas lights for the Ryrie Park tree and Christmas lights for every business on Wallace and Lascelles Streets. 

Correcting history on the Clarke Brothers

Judy Lawson takes issue with last week's story from the Bombay Trail Riders where it was stated "It was named after the notorious Clarke Brothers who regularly robbed coaches making the slow ascent from the valley."

Judy says "Whilst the Clarke brothers are accused of many offences that were never able to be proved, they were never accused of any coach robberies on that road."

"Correcting history.

Over the years there has been many claims published in newspapers, and then in books, concerning the deeds of the Clarke bushrangers. When looking at the legal consequences of the alleged robberies at the time, it becomes apparent that they were the go to boys.

This is especially apparent when the alleged robberies after Superintendent Orridge came to Braidwood on 9 February 1864 are examined. From this time until the Clarke boys were captured, three years and three months later, they were accused of 93 alleged robberies. Only four of these robberies, which involved six warrants, were tried in court. Four of these warrants were cancelled, one case discharged and one dismissed. There were a further twelve warrants issued in this time period, none of which were tested in court. Nor is there any record of the offenders being questioned, charged or convicted for the robberies at this time. Warrants remain alive until cancelled by a magistrate, either because another is found guilty, as in the case of the robbery of Summers' store in Jembalcumbene, or because there was no evidence they perpetrated the crime. An exception can be made regarding the robbery at Crown Flat followed by the imprisonment of the police at Mudmelong. The gang was no doubt guilty, but a court case would further embarrass the police and the government for their inability to arrest the boys on this occasion. There was much criticism of the police at the time. It was convenient to sweep this transgression under the carpet.

From the very first arrest, in 1856, seven years and ten months before the arrival of Orridge, there were nine alleged robberies which were followed up in court. For seven of these robberies there were no consequences. Johnny received 12 months gaol for stealing the racehorse Tar, and Tom O'Connell was found guilty of cattle stealing and sentenced to seven years gaol. But Tom was given early release as the trial was a later deemed mis-trial, with Judge Henry Cary, admitting that an example had been made of Tom because he lived in Jerrabatgully, supposedly a den of thieves, where there was very few arrests.

There were other instances of crime not involving robbery. Thomas Atkinson maintained the boys assaulted him, but no charges were laid; John was served a warrant for aiding Pat O'Connell, an outlaw, but this was never followed up. The boys were accused of murdering Miles O'Grady, the four Special Constables, Bill Scott and James Dornan, but the Attorney General, James Martin and the Inspector of Police, John McLerie, looked at the depositions and decided there was not sufficient evidence for a conviction.

Tom O'Connell was convicted of wounding John Emmott, but again gained early release on John's evidence declaring that Tom had helped him, not injured him.

Thomas and John Clarke were convicted and subsequently hanged for wounding Constable Walsh at their capture. A full account of this trial, with all its faults and transgressions, can be found in my book. It would fall into the category of judicial murder.

Gadfly

'Sam who? Oh, Samantha Moyston...yes, I've seen her on The Drum. Seems like a pleasant person; very bright and on the ball...but that's about it.'

The PM's introduction of Ms Moyston as our next Governor-General added little to the bare fact of the appointment. Google later revealed that she was married to a respected Sydney lawyer in Simeon Beckett, and they were the proud parents of a single daughter.

No doubt we'll get to know the family a little better when she takes over from the virtually invisible former Army General, David Hurley who followed to the letter his riding instructions from PM Scott Morrison: 'Don't make waves'. Albanese would not have had the temerity - much less the need - to issue such a decree to Ms Moyston. But then, he doesn't need to keep secret the appointment of five additional ministries.

I have a particular interest in the Yarralumla announcement, having recently completed the writing of 'The Hidden Story of Charles Weston - poet, artist and tree planter.' and have just signed a publishing agreement with the National Library of Australia. It tells a very different story of Canberra's beginnings from that of the American couple, Walter and Marion Burley Griffin.

For it was Weston rather than the Griffins who laid the foundation for the creation of the National Capital with his planting of some three million trees and shrubs in 1915-1925. Indeed, when PM Billy Hughes sacked Walter Griffin in 1920 and Weston took formal control, he started virtually from scratch. Even Griffin's original street plan which reserved residential development for the north side of the lake had been radically redrawn.

In 1915 Weston had appointed his deputy, John Peace Hobday - who had trained at Windsor Castle - to oversee the development of the Yarralumla property, initially as a hostel for visiting VIPs and later as the official Governor-General's residence. (Griffin had planned the G-G residence as a close neighbour to a permanent Parliament House.)

Hobday - and his family - returned to the Yarralumla grounds when he became Superintendent in the late 1930s. And the current G-G recently permitted us a tour of the various buildings saved and remodelled from that era.

It was a rare privilege, and one that, I believe, should be more widely accessible to the Australian public in 2024 than the cloistered attitudes yesteryear.

Indeed, the secret Morrison ministries - to say nothing of the Whitlam sacking - should be warning enough that the Vice-Regal operations would greatly benefit from the 'sunshine of public exposure.' While the Governor-General is the monarchy's representative to Australians, the individual is equally Australians' conduit to the monarchy. And we have every right to know the attitudes and actions made on our behalf by the G-G herself.

Perhaps the most effective way for her to convey her approach would be through a single address to the National Press Club. Ideally, it would be followed by questions submitted by journalists and selected by the Club's president to avoid the cheap 'gotcha' queries beloved by some of the television journos.

Whether self-censored or open slather, the occasion would be no more radical than the recent requirement for public explanation by the Governor of the Reserve Bank after each meeting of the Board. Moreover, King Charles III is hardly likely to object to any measure that would expand the public connection to Buckingham Palace.

And even the most ardent republican would support a measure that stamped an Australian as the de facto head of state.

Passive Land Hydration Pt 6 - Micro Swales

The simplest of all garden edging is the spade edge. Where the garden meets the lawn, a spade is used to cut the edge of the lawn. A small furrow is left in the garden bed to prevent mulch washing into the grass. In an unplanned garden this furrow usually acts as a drain. If our garden beds are created on contour, this furrow will become a Micro Swale.

I create all my garden beds on contour because it is the best way to passively hydrate them, and the greater landscape. Garden beds made off contour don't capture runoff, only the water that falls on the surface of the garden bed.

Construction

I cut a Micro Swale across the uphill side of the bed, around 10-20cm wide and 100mm deep. This becomes the collection point for runoff from garden paths, to spread and soak through the bed downhill. Each garden bed overflowing downhill into the next one, all the time spreading and soaking across the entire yard.

This edge takes maintenance twice a year to keep it from growing over with grass. The Micro Swale sometimes limits my access to the double reach garden beds on the top side because the furrow is not big enough for my foot to easily fit. In some instances where the path runoff above is considerable, I may dig the furrow wider to fit my foot, but I prefer to fill the furrow with round pebbles as mentioned last week when I introduced Secret Swales [Ed 200](#) (Hyperlink please alex.)

If the path above the bed is also covered in pebbles, there will be less debris washed into the Micro Swale, maintaining capacity for longer. If the pebbles become filled with debris they can be easily lifted to wash out or replace them. Any grass or weeds that strike in the pebbles will be easily removed by hand as there is no soil for the roots to set.

This is a watering only system used in conjunction with other passive hydration systems to create a waterway through my house garden. I keep an eye on plants to make sure they have the water they need, and occasionally hand water. Most of the watering is done in my garden by Mother Nature and her Skywater deliveries. My input long since complete, the system now looks after me. Its not totally hands off, but its as close as I am willing to get without going to full automation.

This week

I find Autumn one of the busiest times of the year in the garden and in other homesteading duties. The weather is more palatable than summer, the days are shorter and the preparations for winter wait for no human.

Basil is still growing strong. I've harvested end of summer seed so now its fresh leaf until the frost comes to melt it. Some have become significant shrubbery with stems as thick as my thumb. Fresh basil is awesome so I'm going to see if I can protect it from the frosts and maintain harvest longer than usual. To do this I have planted Snow Peas to create a living Cloche as they sprawl up over the basil. Its going to be a race to see if the vine grows fast enough to provide cover before a significant frost arrives.

After the Tomatoes

The Tommy Toes are the only tomato left in the garden. They are still producing flowers and ripe fruit. The other tomato root systems were so extensive that removing them would have disrupted the entire bed. So I chopped them at the base and left the roots in there.

Leaving the roots in the soil provides organic matter for microbes to munch and convert to plant food. The decaying roots will leave air pathways through the soil, reducing compaction and allowing for water infiltration to hydrate the soil. The main reason to leave them in the soil is to maintain the complex structure created by the microbes.

Tomatoes are usually the only roots I remove, but only to prevent the build up of nasties in the soil. However, with good crop rotation and awareness of the potential issues I will not plant nightshades here again for 2-4 years.

New plantings

I am planting brassicas and leafy greens in the empty tomato beds. Succession planting every two weeks will provide tucker throughout the winter. I already have lucerne planted in the bed for summer nitrification and deep mineral mining. Now I plant Snow Peas next to the tomato root and grow them up the tomato trellis. This provides winter nitrification and in 6 weeks Ill be eating Snow peas.

Snow Peas

I've often heard it said that peas don't grow over winter in our region. I grow them every autumn and all through winter into spring. Every year for more than a decade I've been eating fresh snow peas all winter. What they don't like is summer heat, so spring plantings are less productive.

I find them a great winter garden filler. I grow them up deciduous trees, fences, trellises and sometimes I even let them run across the garden as a ground cover. I plant them along paths, so visitors to the garden always have a nibble nearby. There are never enough snow peas in my garden. Plant them after a feeder crop. Plant them to establish a new bed. Plant them in a tired bed. Plant them as a Cloche for next seasons tomatoes. Plant them next to the gate. The back door. Plant them everywhere.


In our rich mineral soil, they taste minty, way better than anything you can buy. You can eat them within seconds of picking them, so they are fresh, fresh, fresh and nutrient dense. I don't recall how many times Snow Peas have made it into the kitchen over the years, but it hasn't been many. Most of the Snow Peas I grow get eaten in the garden.

Removing summer plantings reveals thinning mulch, so don't forget to top up. The winds are on their way and that can be as dehydrating as summer sun. Mulching will also suppress the weeds when they start to pop again in the milder weather.

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New TAFE diploma for planners

In a first for NSW, budding planners will soon have a TAFE pathway into the planning profession with a new diploma open for enrolments.

The brand-new Diploma of Local Government (Planning) will support school leavers and future planners on their way into paraplanning, a role that manages a lot of the initial assessment, research and review to provide valuable support to planners. Through a collaboration between the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure, TAFE NSW, Local Government NSW and the Planning Institute of Australia, the Diploma has been adapted from TAFE SA's curriculum to reflect planning practices in NSW.

The Australian National Skills Commission has identified planning as a skills shortage area with a strong future demand, with strong demand for a diploma of this nature.

In a recent survey, more than 85 per cent of council respondents indicated they would consider upskilling existing staff with the qualification or employing planning cadets currently enrolled in the diploma.

Between 2021-22 and 2022-23, shortages of planners contributed to a 28 per cent increase in the average number of days taken to determine local development applications in NSW. A recent Productivity Commission report found that between 2016 and 2021, Sydney lost twice as many people aged 30 to 40 as it gained. 35,000 came to Sydney, but 70,000 left.

While we have a whole generation of people who can't afford to rent or buy a home in NSW, we can't afford to be slowing down housing approvals.

In addition to the TAFE Diploma, the Strong Start Mentoring Program which began in February with 60 mentors continues, and registrations are now open for up to 250 planning mentors and mentees.

Planning students and recent graduates working in councils across the state are invited to register to be paired with experienced planners for professional coaching and support. This year, senior planners in local government are also invited to register as mentors. Last year's inaugural program was an overwhelming success, with all participants reporting improved wellbeing, job satisfaction, career development and personal growth.

One mentee from Shoalhaven City Council described their greatest takeaway as "the ability to feel confident in prioritising my career needs and then working out ways to achieve them."

"My mentor helped me identify strategies to build my confidence and encouraged me to improve communication lines with my supervisor around my needs," they said.

Mentees receive ongoing professional development with quarterly check-ins and workshops run by professional facilitators.

Group sessions will be available for participants to engage in peer-to-peer mentoring.

Memories of Bungendore



An exhibition by artist Penelope McManus, called 'Memories of Bungendore' opens at Water Through Reeds Gallery on 4th of May from 11am. Memories of Bungendore is a collection of oil paintings created over the Summer of 2023/4.

'The works in this exhibition are inspired by my imagination and the memories that have stayed with me throughout my life.'

Growing up in the Bungendore district, my earliest memories are of sitting on the earth drawing with a stick, riding the landscape on horseback, mustering cattle, catching the bus to school on frosty mornings, walking and picnicking in the paddocks and swimming in dams. Watching the seasons change the landscape through the cycles of drought, plagues and floods was fundamental in shaping my deep connection to nature and my creative life.

These paintings hope to connect the viewer with the natural world and evoke feelings of peace, mystery and wonder.

Penelope has spent most of her life living in rural Australia, and has always sought inspiration and refuge in the Australian bush. It's where she feels most connected to herself and her creativity.

Over the past 15 years she has developed her artistic practice to focus on landscape painting, working plein air to create studies of the environment. These observations are then developed into larger paintings in her studio in Bangalow. Each painting is created through layering oil paint and mediums which produce a translucency and texture that can take months to dry and be resolved.

Penelope connects with her local surroundings and the natural world. Her paintings celebrate the beauty and distinctions in the environment, it's landforms, vegetation, qualities of light, water and fauna. Her paintings convey the immediate experience of being in nature and her emotional connection to place.

Penelope believes 'through strengthening our connection with nature, we will want to protect and look after this vulnerable and precious Earth'.

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Local connectivity issues in the spotlight as regional Australians invited to have their say

Communities across regional, rural, and remote Australia can now have their say on telecommunications issues as public submissions open on the Regional Telecommunications Review.

The input of local communities will form an essential part of the Review – held once every three years – which will see the Regional Telecommunications Independent Review Committee deliver recommendations to Government.

The Review is closely examining the experiences of people in regional, rural, and remote parts of Australia with telecommunications delivery, as well as considering the unique needs of First Nations communities.

Residents, businesses and community organisations can make a submission, with the Terms of Reference – announced by Minister for Communications, the Hon Michelle Rowland MP – outlining key issues for the Committee to examine. An issues paper has been released to help frame ideas.

We are focused on how the universal service arrangements could be modernised to meet today's needs, the potential of emerging technologies, the effectiveness of existing Government investment programs, and the improvement of telecommunications in emergencies.

Feedback from the public has been essential in previous reviews to ensure the Committee's recommendations are well-targeted and based on evidence. For this Review there are three options available to have your say: attending a face-to-face consultation, providing a formal submission or completing a survey. The survey will be published in May 2024.

Since March 2024, the Committee has visited Western Australia and Tasmania for face-to-face consultations with local issues also forming an important part of the Committee's considerations. More locations for face-to-face consultations will be announced shortly.

The 2024 Review is being led by the Hon Alannah MacTiernan, former Western Australian Minister for Regional Development as Chair of the Review Committee. She is supported by the Hon Fiona Nash, Ms Kristy Sparrow, Dr Jessa Rogers and Mr Ian Kelly.

Chair, the Hon Alannah MacTiernan said "Access to telecommunications services is critical for regional residents and businesses across so many aspects of everyday life – and we want to understand the lived experience of these services so that future policy actions are well-targeted and backed up by evidence.

"With technology changing rapidly we also want your ideas about how things can be improved and what would make the most difference for you and your community.

"We really encourage Australians in the bush to have their say via a submission or completing the survey in coming months, while we continue our face-to-face consultations across the country.



This metaphor also reminds us that we are connected to each other. There are moments in our life of faith when we hear or see other Christians saying or doing things we cannot countenance. We can try to disown them by retreating into our denomination, but we are all connected in Christ's vineyard. We need the courage to tell them the truth as we see it, and charitably point out the problems we have with what they think is right. And we need the humility to listen when they challenge us.

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Palliative care volunteers give a gift no one else can

Volunteer Program

The Southern NSW Local Health District (SNSWLHD) Palliative Care Program is building a palliative care volunteer service across the Southern region. We are currently looking for suitable volunteers to support compassionate end of life care in the home for the wider Braidwood region.

The role of volunteers in palliative care is unique. From its inception, palliative care has included volunteers who have played an integral, independent, and important part of palliative care teams across the world. The volunteer role is complementary to that of specialist palliative and community care staff, focusing more on the social and emotional wellbeing of their clients, carers and family, whilst bringing connection, compassion, companionship and a link to the wider community.

“Our volunteers are there for the person not the illness. We say to our volunteers that ‘you are the icing on the cake, you are there to support the work of friends and family, clinicians and professionals.’ The role is wide and varied, and completely dependent on the individual needs of clients and carers, and the support they provide has been shown to improve wellbeing, quality of life, and make life seem more normal and enjoyable.”

Volunteers and clients are matched by the coordinator and the regular volunteer visits in the home each time, ensuring trusting relationships can be formed over time. “Knowing that your volunteer will be there at a scheduled time for a chat or to assist you doing the things you want to do or to provide in-home respite so that carers may leave to do errands, can bring a sense of continuity, care and peace of mind. Some clients and carers have likened their relationship with their volunteer as having a fellow traveller along with them and having another trusted person in their care team.”

Volunteers give the gift of their time. Many of our volunteers have experience in supporting a family member or friend through end of life, while others wish to support their community and make a difference where they are needed. After their training, volunteers develop the unique skill of truly being present, non-judgemental and open to client’s needs.

Volunteers also benefit. Research has shown that well trained and supported palliative care volunteers have a positive and meaningful volunteer experience and consider their role to be a privilege. Volunteers say that their experience has provided them with personal benefits such as growth, satisfaction, and an understanding of what is important in their own lives.

“At the heart of their effectiveness is the fact that they give their time, skill and support for free, for people they may never have met before, simply because they wish to give back to their community and make a difference. This is a gift no one else could provide.”

Successful volunteer recruits are assisted with required security clearances, vaccinations, provided with a three-day initial training program and ongoing support from a dedicated volunteer coordinator. 

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Yoga pose of the week

Leg Lock Pose – Supta Pawanmuktasana

A great yoga pose to strengthen the lower back muscles and bring suppleness to the whole spinal column. It massages the abdominal and digestive organs helping to shift stagnation. Renown for stimulating the pelvic muscles to balance the reproductive organs.

To practice - Lie on you back. Engage the left leg muscles keeping the leg straight and in contact with the floor. Bend the right knee to bring the thigh towards the chest and interlock the fingers around the shin. Raise the head and shoulders off the ground and bring the nose towards the knee. Hold for a few seconds then slowly lower the head and shoulders. Practice up to 3 times with the right leg, then up to 3 times with the left. If comfortable practice with both knees drawn towards you. To add the compression in abdomen and pelvis, in hale as you lift, exhale as you lower.
