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## Is the Braidwood Book Fair turning its final page?

For more than 25 years, the Anglican Church of Braidwood has organized the Book Fairs and provided the storage and sorting facilities. Starting all those years ago, as a small stall outside the church each Sunday and growing exponentially to the huge event it is now, a true Braidwood icon that is enjoyed by so many.

A small committee from the Church oversees the organisation and has watched it grow like topsy both in size and popularity.

Traditionally held twice each year, around 26th January holiday and the June long-weekend, the Book Fairs are very much enjoyed by the locals and bring many visitors to Braidwood, several of whom come just for these Fairs and consequently also visit the cafe's and other Braidwood attractions.

Over the past 5 years, even with 2 COVID related cancellations, 8 Book Fairs have been held, averaging gross takings of approx. \$18,000 for each event. Many local community groups have benefitting from the distribution of these funds being a huge help in an environment where it is difficult to fundraise.

All the books offered are donated and come from near and far, thus providing the huge and interesting range of books that have become synonymous with our Book Fairs.

A very supportive band of community members volunteer their time and energy, regularly pre-sorting the donated books and also each day of trading at the Book Fairs. Their help is integral to the smooth running of the events and on a happy note, gives them time together which otherwise does not happen.

During the past 12 months, interest in taking over the organisation was sought from selected community groups but a commitment was not able to be secured, so it is with great sadness that we announce the final curtain will be coming down on this iconic Braidwood event as, basically, we're like our old books - well worn! At this stage, we plan to hold the last Book Fair in January 2025 - around the Australia Day holiday - and ask that no more donations be delivered please, as we have plenty of books for this Fair and everything must be gone on the final day. So, the 2025 January Book Fair will be the last hurrah... UNLESS...

## Results of the Survey of Priority Issues and Projects for Braidwood and surrounding district to be progressed during the next term of Council

### Approach used

The **Braidwood Community Association** (BCA) conducted a survey of the local community in Braidwood and surrounding district (2622 post code) asking them to rate 18 issues and projects to determine priorities to be progressed during the next term of Queanbeyan and Palerang Regional Council (QPRC).

These 18 issues were determined from issues identified in previous surveys, issues which the BCA is working on, and suggestions by members of the BCA. The survey was open from 12 July until 12 August and involved both an on-line and hard copy survey of all residents in 2622. To reduce bias in the responses, the on-line survey randomized the order of the questions.

Residents were informed that the survey results would be used to create a shortlist of 5 to 6 priority projects which the BCA would then ask all Council candidates to commit to supporting and progressing, should they be elected, prior to the upcoming QPRC elections.

The BCA will not endorse any particular candidate or group but will give publicity to those who have committed to progressing the community's priority projects and those who have not.

### Results

Some 188 people responded to the survey with 173 on-line and 15 with hard copy forms. This represents a response rate approaching 9 percent of the estimated voting population[1]. All indicated they lived in 2622, with 83 living in Braidwood, 28 in a surrounding village and 84 rural (some respondents put more than one type of location). 92% indicated they were full-time residents.

Respondents were invited to rate each potential project from very low to very high importance on a 5-step scale. A weighted average can be calculated by giving 'very low' a score of 1 and 'very high' a score of 5, with appropriate weightings for the intermediate ratings. If the average score is over 4, then respondents believe the issue is over high importance.

### The projects in order of descending priority are given overleaf, with the top 6 projects being:

- 1.Better maintenance of rural roads
- 2.Long-term strategic plan for Braidwood
- 3.Securing Braidwood's water supply
- 4.Harmonisation of water, sewage, and waste charges across QPRC
- 5.Environmental enhancement
- 6.Community Transport

If an issue/project is not on this list above, it does not mean it will not be progressed during the next term of Council. It just means that the BCA is not asking Council candidates to commit to supporting and progressing them.

The full results are given in the table overleaf.

[1] The population over 18 years old and over in Palerang Eastern Areas in the 2021 census, which approximates to 2622, and totals 2197 persons.

At the meeting held on 14 August Council endorsed the naming of the new Council Chambers as the WB Freebody Chambers. Council is now seeking the community's feedback on the proposed name.

'This is a great opportunity to honour Mr Freebody and his contributions to the region by naming the new chambers after him,' said Mayor Kenrick Winchester.

'We recently honoured Queanbeyan's First Nations history with the naming of our Council headquarters and surrounding spaces and I think this is a great way for us to honour our more recent history with someone who has played such a significant role in our town.'

William Byrne (WB) Freebody served as alderman on the Queanbeyan City Council continuously from 1917 to 1956. During this time, he was elected and served as Mayor for six terms (1926-1927, 1930-1932, 1951).

Mr Freebody was born in Dalgety in 1887 and moved to Queanbeyan in 1907. He was a prominent businessman who operated a bicycle and sports equipment business. He extended his business interests and opened a petrol depot.

He had a keen interest in cycle and motorcycle racing and formed the first motor cycle club in 1916. In the 1930s he purchased and rebuilt the Triumph Theatre and in the same period obtained a lease of a building on Monaro Street which became the Star Theatre.

Mr Freebody was a keen sportsman participating in cycling, rugby union, cricket, tennis, and bowls and served as the President of the Queanbeyan Park Tennis Club for a number of years.

Mr Freebody passed away in May 1962.



## Harmful products spread with full knowledge

Former Cabinet Minister Matt Kean knew that contaminated recycled waste products were being distributed across the environment and communities, but did not act to stop the practice.

A Ministerial Briefing note, obtained under freedom of information laws, has revealed that in December 2021 the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) told the Government that recovered waste products, known as recovered fines, were "not fit for purpose" and "should not be reused broadly in the community".

Between December 2021 and May 2022, the EPA halted planned changes to the recovered waste industry after pressure from commercial interests. No further regulatory action was taken by the EPA or Government to prevent asbestos, glass, plastics and heavy metals from being sold and distributed in consumer products across NSW.

### Greens MP and spokesperson for the environment Sue Higginson said

"Something happened between the end of 2021 and mid 2022 that allowed hazardous materials to continue to be sold and distributed by producers of recovered fines from waste,"

"This briefing note, signed by the then Environment Minister, recommended changes to the regulatory system for these products, recognised the harm that the materials could cause, and pushed back on the financial consequences for commercial interests. The EPA specifically recognised the potential financial impacts, but asserted that it's primary function is protection of the environment and communities," "It is baffling, that by May 2022, the EPA cancelled any changes to the industry, and the Coalition Government did not act to make changes to protect the environment or communities from contaminated recovered fines,"

"The current Leader of the Opposition, Mark Speakman, made representations in 2021 on behalf of one of the companies that produced recovered fines that indicated the EPA's evidence was flawed and out of date. But 3 years later there is still asbestos and other contaminants being sold at garden supply stores and being spread over playgrounds,"

"There is a case to be answered here, whether there has been undue political interference or plain incompetence, why was this industry not fixed at any of the times it was highlighted as a risk. The reviews in 2013, 2019 and 2020 all proved that the product was dangerous - but no one acted to stop it. This is a toxic legacy that needs to be explained and fixed." Ms Higginson said.

## Gadfly

I have never met an Aboriginal of any age and either sex whom I didn't like...immediately and thereafter.

The first bloke I met was a boundary rider on a far northwest Queensland sheep station where I was a rouseabout in the property's shearing team. My mate, the team's wool presser, Alan Blunt and I were hunting plain turkeys in his VW when we crossed paths on the boundary line.

We stopped and after a while he climbed down from his old mare, and we boiled the billy. Turned out he'd had a small part in Jедда the movie and we had a good old yarn. I met his family later and his father showed me how to throw a killing boomerang, the kind that flies flat, doesn't come back, but can break a kangaroo's neck at 70 paces.

After that I met the poet Kath Walker who became Odgeroo Noonuccal when she expanded her artistic and political range beyond her poetry that at the time was only fair to middling. No, I tell a lie; it was awful. But she was a lovely person, and I was a Cadet journo on The Courier-Mail. I wrote a piece that helped get her started on her activist path.

Since then, as private secretary to a Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, Ralph Hunt I've met and talked with very many of our Continent's forebears; other times as a documentary video maker; then as a Canberra Times columnist initiating our own reconciliation walk across Commonwealth Bridge; and finally while researching my last two books.

I've never been disappointed once.

I'm not suggesting they were all paragons of virtue. When the men get a taste for the whitefella booze that offers an escape from the reality of their place at the bottom of the Australian totem pole, they can lash out at the nearest person to them – usually a wife and mother of their children – just like the wife beaters in our own community.

No one's perfect, but I've constantly felt a unique gentility and an instant generous connection that is all their own. Then four years ago, I began work on the biography of a whitefella who gave his life to the Aboriginal cause, a man of immense courage and deep sensibility, named Donald Thomson. Our first home-grown anthropologist, Donald spent most of his adult life with them and his experience was similar to mine. The book was a joy to write because he felt exactly the same about them.

He was also a writer and newspaper columnist for much of his life. I used a lot of his work in the book and though he died in 1970 it often felt as though we were sitting side by side, writing together. It was an absolutely joyous experience. But here's the thing we can't understand – and I invite you to answer the question: Why do our white compatriots so easily forgive the British for not just stealing the Aboriginals' homeland but then trying to wipe them out?

And now that the land and its treasures have made us rich, why are they so reluctant to welcome them into the great councils of government? Why do they select just the 'stolen generations' to offer an apology, rather than a treaty and some decent recompense to the survivors of the holocaust our kind visited upon them?

How do they suppress a bitterly ironic laughter when our Prime Ministers and Foreign Ministers from both sides of the political aisle, berate other nations for their human rights' shortcomings while standing up for 'our Australian values'?

I can think of a few answers but none that really makes sense. The Aboriginal people are our own patriotic forebears in the great south land. They are good people. Why do we hate them so?

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# FUTURE FARMER

Growing tucker where they told him he couldn't, since the turn of the century

## Stumping

I like to do as little as possible to achieve a given result. If I miss the target, the next time I will add one new action to the sequence. I've been 'advised' to do all manner of things to achieve a goal. Valiant efforts with all the bibs and bobs, but it becomes difficult to see what elements worked and what did not. When something goes wrong, how do you deduce what area to explore, and how to replicate it somewhere else.

Life is relentless, I can't afford to repeat things that don't work, I'm unsure about, or wastes my precious time. So, I approach my garden a little differently than most. I've found many benefits to my lazy approach; I've saved time and learnt a lot about my veggies.

## Cleanup

I don't clean up my garden at the end of the season. My beds are rarely empty, with vegetables at different stages of growth based on my crop rotation. When it comes time to refresh the beds after 2 years of work, there is always plenty still growing.

Disrupting the delicate structure of the soil is like a Microbe Tsunami. Microbes die, fungal webs are broken, and the soil suffers. The Microbes I have been breeding in my garden beds have done a great job of creating a healthy soil structure and creating nutrient dense tucker for my plants. It seems counter intuitive to rip out plants and disrupt their work. The soil nutrient cycle works best when it is left undisturbed.

## Stumping

When it comes to removing old plants from the garden, my preferred method is Stumping. Grab your secateurs and cut the plant off at the base of the stem, maybe 50mm above the mulch. I have used this technique for years and I have learnt something, Brassicas are perennials, not annuals. If you've been playing along at home and eating from your garden this winter, you have been harvesting your Brassicas, Kale, Cabbage, Broccoli and Cauliflower. The healthy plant looks good enough to eat whole after the first harvest. It seems a shame to remove them. I usually don't and the plants deliver a second smaller harvest. At the end of this season, I stump them, and next season they provide again.

Stumping the plant leaves the soil intact, the roots become part of the garden, and new pathways are created for water and air to move through.

Boosting the soil naturally and reducing compaction without mechanical assistance.

## Brassicas

As Spring arrives, Brassicas go to seed. I have many varieties growing in my garden, I don't want them all to go to seed at once, so I cut them down to slow their seed making. I can usually get 3 varieties to set seed in an average Spring.

My Cabbages are starting to flower now, so is my Kale, so I cut the flowers off one of them to allow the other to produce seed. Sometimes it's a previously stumped Brassica and is very leggy, so I Stump it and let it come back again to produce seed. This usually buys me enough time between varieties.

Once the variety has produced seed, I Stump it and wait until next season to harvest tucker again. I usually leave a Brassica for 2 years with good success, and a I have a few that are 3 years old. Cabbage, Broccoli and Kale are good for stumping, Cauliflower less so. As the Stumped plants are in the ground, they will be ready and waiting for the conditions to be correct and then they start to grow. I find that the stumped varieties provide tucker quicker next season than freshly planted seedlings, so I eat winter vegetables sooner.

## Celery

Celery is one of our vegetables that takes longer than 90 days to harvest, but it may provide stalks to eat within that time. I never harvest the whole plant as I'm not a market gardener. Instead, I pick one stalk off each plant for the stock pot and one a day for me to munch in the garden.

I don't need any more Celery in my garden so when it starts to set seed, it gets a stumping. I need to stump it 2-4 times through spring to avoid seed. It's the same for Brassicas, when Summer hits and the threat of seed has passed, it will start to grow tucker again. I've had some of my Celery for many years and I've been eating it all winter.

## Peas and Beans

It is important to Stump all vegetables because some roots are more beneficial to the soil. That's why I grow Broad Beans over winter. I rarely eat them. I love the biomass for compost and they provide nitrifying nodules on their roots just like Peas. Removing the roots will be removing nutrients, and the makers of the nutrients who attach themselves to the nodules. Don't pull them out, Stump them and leave the roots in the soil.

## This week


Manchurian Pears are in full bloom and starting to produce leaf. The Chinese Elms in the ground have started to produce leaf. Mulberries are producing leaf. The Caladenias are in flower, the first of the orchids on our hill. King Parrots have returned.

Broccoli planted in succession, at the end of May are starting to produce heads, the Broccoli I stumped last spring is still producing. Cabbages stumped last spring are going to seed after producing smaller heads. Lettuce and Spinach providing plenty of leafy greens even though it was planted late in June.

Snow Peas have had a mixed winter. Some planted with friends provided Peas to eat, but most didn't do well. The possum has munched on the good ones growing up trees. With the subtle arrival of spring, all the Snow Peas have started to grow again with vigour. The late planting didn't let them create their own microclimate and thrive through winter. The haggard ones in the garden are now looking great and will out preform a freshly planted seedling, so it is still a win.

Soil temp in my garden has climbed to 12C, a significant jump from 8C only 2 weeks ago. My soil temp may be ready to plant Tomatoes in August for the very first time. Happy Spring!

## Time is running out to complete your farm census

Time is running out for NSW farmers to report their livestock numbers and agricultural land use before the annual land and stock return portal closes on 31 August.

Local Land Services Executive Director Regional Delivery Rob Kelly said around 170,000 land managers were taking part in the 2024 farm census.

"This is the last chance farmers have to lodge returns before the reporting portal closes," Mr Kelly said. "We are encouraging all ratepayers to take the opportunity to lodge their return to help protect NSW farming and agriculture. "This helps us shape the support we offer land managers during disasters and if there was a biosecurity outbreak in NSW.

Completing returns is an easy process, with two options available:

- submit returns online via [www.lls.nsw.gov.au/aslr](http://www.lls.nsw.gov.au/aslr)
- Return the paper form via mail or to a Local Land Services office.

Mr Kelly said it was important all landholders completed their annual land and stock return even if they carried no livestock.

"Everyone needs to do their annual land and stock return to avoid unnecessary fees," he said. "The Animal Health and Meat Industry Levy is automatically applied to their next rates notice if they fail to complete their return."



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## Cultural Tourism in Regional NSW



This month saw the launch of the Regional Arts Network's report on 'Cultural Tourism in Regional NSW'. The report is the product of a state-wide project led by @southeastarts and their Executive Director Andrew Gray, in partnership with @thepatternmakers. The report is an advocacy tool for cultural tourism infrastructure in regional NSW. There are so many incredible attractions in our regions that deserve to be in the national and international spotlight.

### The key findings include:

- There are over 3,200 cultural tourism experiences on offer in regional NSW – three times as many as previously estimated.
- Cultural tourism visitors spend over \$6bn while travelling in regional in NSW, but the contribution to the state's economy is likely much larger than the statistics suggest.
- The drivers of visitation are not well understood, and policy and funding mechanisms can do more to support authentic and distinctive experiences.

## Anglican Parish

### Eat me

This short gospel passage (John 6: 56-69) is full of drama; of confusion, outrage, offence and rejection. Jesus is teaching in a synagogue at Capernaum. Its bursting with people who have been following him since the feeding of the 5,000. The drama turns on the interpretation of his claim to be “the bread of life...whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in them.” Many respond with a rising crescendo of outrage and confusion: “This is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?” Jesus responds: “Does this offend you?” Many leave. Taken literally, yes, its offensive to our sensibilities. However, those offended did not hear or understand his clarification that ‘The Spirit gives life...the words I have spoken to you – they are full of the Spirit and life’. ‘Flesh and blood’ is an idiom still much in use today that refers to shared intimacy, of the same kind, kin, or to take the whole person as they are, their very being. The Aramaic word for ‘eat’ is ‘akal’. The following explanation offers something deeper.

“There are two possible root words [for ‘akal’], ‘alakam’ which means to consume or ‘kallah’ which means your inward physical parts, like your kidneys, or spiritual [part] like your soul... The root word is ‘alakam’ but it is a play on the word ‘kallah’. In other words, you are to consume the words of Jesus ‘alakam’ so they become a part of your being – ‘kallah’... In other words, ‘Consume my Words [full of Spirit] and let them become your source of life.’”\*

## Braidwood Uniting Church

### From my heart

It's a mistake for churches to focus on God. The whole point of all revelation is to find and confirm meaning in the world. One of my favorite scholars says, “all revelation is a summons and a sending”. The goal of revelation ought not be ‘reflection’ but rather, ‘realization’. No wonder that so many people have memories of church that ring of pointlessness. Intuitively they know that something crucial is missing. All the singing and prayers are ok but it's hard to see how they lead to life. All the people who dismiss the church and tell me, “Hey, I just aim to do my best in life”, have a revelation that the church desperately needs to hear.

This week all main-line churches will ponder Jesus words, “I am the bread of life”. Most clergy who will give a homily will concentrate on the “I am” of that statement. But this is I suspect, to miss the point. The emphasis of the statement should be with, “on life”. Jesus was the fellow who after doing some amazing things, generally instructed people not to talk about it. His focus always seemed to be on life, lived to the full. Jesus did all he could to avoid celebrity. He knew he could draw a crowd, but he'd tell them to their faces, “you like fish fingers and bread rolls but you don't have a taste for that which would bring you to life”.

Remember the astonishing time when Jesus was caught working on the Sabbath? In his cultural context, he was breaking one of the biggest rules. His response to “god's policemen” at the time was, “The Sabbath was made for man (ie the good of humanity) rather than man being made for the Sabbath”. In other words, if your religious requirements crush life, there's something wrong with your religion. Think of how many ways this principal should apply. How many people lived in misery because marriage was constructed as a religious absolute and moral prison. The plain truth is that there many bringers of death who quote the bible or church tradition and who feel somehow justified or better for having crushed someone.

So, I have no interest in running a “god franchise”. I want to be part of a people who will help each other embrace life, reaching for the highest and best. 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## NSW patients more likely to rate hospital care highly despite increasing pressures on NSW healthcare system

A new report from the **Bureau of Health Information** (BHI) shows patients' experiences in NSW hospitals improved between 2022 and 2023 despite increasing pressures on the healthcare system during this time. BHI Chief Executive Dr Diane Watson said the latest results of the Adult Admitted Patient Survey show NSW patients are generally positive about their hospital care. "Of the more than 20,000 NSW patients surveyed, 92% said, overall, the care they received in NSW public hospitals in 2023 was either 'very good' or 'good'. Of those, 68% of patients said 'very good', up from 66% in 2022," Dr Watson said.

"These results reflect real improvements in the hospital care experiences of patients across the state and are a credit to the health professionals caring for them."

Across the survey, there were improvements from the previous year for more than half of all questions, with patients more likely to provide high ratings for questions about health professionals, their involvement in decisions about their care, and the coordination and timeliness of their care.

For example:

· 66% of patients rated how well the health professionals worked together as a team as 'very good' (up from 63% in 2022).

· 69% said they 'definitely' had enough time to discuss their health or medical problem with health professionals (up from 66%).

· 74% said 'the right amount' of information about their condition or treatment was given to their family, carer or someone close to them (up from 71%).

The report also compares the experiences of more than 10,000 patients who were admitted to large rural hospitals with those admitted to urban hospitals.

"Our analyses found that patients admitted to rural hospitals reported significantly more positive experiences for most questions, including for questions related to overall satisfaction and outcomes, involvement in decision-making and the physical environment of the hospital," Dr Watson said.

Patients who attended urban hospitals were significantly more positive for just one question, with 83% saying they received a document summarising their hospital care at discharge, compared with 70% of rural patients.

Aboriginal patients' hospital experiences were also a focus of the report. Of the 2,656 Aboriginal patients who provided feedback, almost eight in 10 (77%) said they were 'always' treated with respect and dignity while in hospital, and that their cultural and religious beliefs were 'always' respected by the hospital staff.

However, fewer than three in 10 Aboriginal patients (29%) said they received support, or the offer of support, from an Aboriginal health worker while they were in hospital.

"Our report provides more evidence for the importance of access to Aboriginal health workers for Aboriginal patients, with almost all people who were supported by these staff (94%) reporting that they felt more supported with their care," Dr Watson said.

## NSW Supreme Court dismisses legal challenge to feral horse control

The NSW Supreme Court has today comprehensively dismissed a legal challenge from a pro-feral horse group seeking to overturn the use of aerial shooting in Kosciuszko National Park. The Snowy Mountain Bush Users Group Inc has been ordered to pay taxpayers costs.

Jack Gough, Advocacy Director of the Invasive Species Council said: 'We are pleased that the ongoing removal of feral horses from Kosciuszko National Park will continue through the use of aerial shooting.'

'We have full confidence that national park staff are undertaking these important operations professionally, safely and humanely, as has been confirmed by numerous independent reviews, including by the RSPCA and vets.'

'This is a comprehensive dismissal of a deeply flawed legal challenge by a small group who don't want to see a single horse removed from Kosciuszko National Park.'

'The original grounds for the challenge were that there were animal welfare issues or problems with the scientific count of horses. The plaintiffs then dropped these grounds when they clearly realised they had no hope of success.'

'Instead they focussed on a narrow procedural argument which the Supreme Court has thrown out. The court has also ordered this group to pay the taxpayers costs of defending this case.'

'We have now seen 7 cases in Victoria and NSW where a small group who don't want to see a single horse removed are trying to frustrate the important work of our national park staff. Every single one of these court cases have been dismissed.'

'No one likes to see animals killed, but the sad reality is that we have a choice to make between urgently reducing the numbers of feral horses or accepting the destruction of sensitive alpine ecosystems and habitats, and the decline and extinction of native animals.'

'A Senate Inquiry questioned the constitutional validity of this legislation and its ability to comply with both the EPBC Act and the NSW Kosciuszko Wild Horse Heritage Act 2018.'

'With Labor, the Liberals, the Greens and key independents all committed to urgently removing feral horses from the Snowies, the Parliament must now step in and step up to fix this law urgently.'

'We may not like it, but culling by highly trained professionals is the only viable way of reducing numbers and saving the national park and our native animals that live there.'



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# Telco problems significantly impacting regional, rural, and remote Australians

## **Data collated by the Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman (TIO) has found that Australians living outside of metropolitan hubs are experiencing significant issues with their telcos.**

Between 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2024, the TIO received 51,854 phone and internet complaints from consumers living in regional, rural and remote Australia about faults, poor service quality, poor mobile service coverage, outages and accessibility barriers.

Regional consumers told the TIO that faults and service problems can take longer to be resolved in regional locations. In some cases, a regional customer may report faults over several years without any lasting improvements to their services.

Unlike people in metropolitan areas, regional consumers may have no choice but to depend on their landline or satellite service when there are no other options. Often, mobile coverage is poor in regional, rural and remote areas in Australia.

The TIO also heard about consumers who sign up to a mobile service after being told that their mobile will work in their area, but when returning home to a remote location find they have no service.

This can be especially dangerous for consumers living in areas at greater risk of bushfires, cyclones, floods and other natural disasters. Reliable access to telco services plays a critical role in the coordination of disaster response, recovery and in sharing timely and accurate information during major outages and crises. While satellite services may resolve connectivity issues for some consumers, these services can be highly dependent on weather conditions. The TIO's complaint data shows consumers in regional areas continue to experience unreliable connections and service quality problems. Satellite is also a more expensive service type, and may not be affordable for all consumers.

The telco regulatory framework needs to be modernised to ensure regional consumers can have reliable telco services.

The TIO's recommendations to improve phone and internet services for regional, rural and remote Australian's include:

- One coherent, robust and modern regulatory framework rather than the USO scheme, SIP regime, and CSG regime to offer standards for different services
- The SIP regime should have clear benchmarks and standards so that consumers can seek compensation from a SIP
- In reviewing the USO framework, the government should consider the essential nature of mobile services, to ensure the regulatory framework meets community expectations
- Mobile coverage maps should be standardised, accessible to all consumers, and should include information about geographical location, quality of coverage, and data speeds.
- First Nations consumers should be consulted on plans about how to help close the digital inclusion gap.
- There needs to be an increased focus on mobile accessibility to improve connectivity for First Nations consumers living in regional areas.

Ombudsman Cynthia Gebert said "Telecommunication services are essential services, as important to our health and way of life as the electricity and water in our homes. We rely on phone and internet services in emergencies, for work, banking, telehealth services, social cohesion – everything. We need a policy agenda that reflects the indispensable nature of telecommunications."

"Regional, rural, and remote consumers are getting left behind, and it's time that serious efforts are made to address the digital divide in this country. ## Reporting Crime Works - "An increase in reporting crime is helping solve crimes for farmers"

"Reporting crime works" is the message from Crime Stoppers and the **NSW Police Force**.

Since the launch of our Rural Crime Awareness Campaign, NSW Police Force have seen a 12% increase\* in the number of rural crime related incidents reported. Information from rural communities and the prompt reporting of offences are key to helping solve crimes for our farmers and in some instances enable police to return stolen property.

In a recent survey\*\* by the Centre for Rural Criminology at the University of New England shows the five most common crimes experienced by farmers in NSW are trespass (75%), illegal shooting / hunting (52%), theft of equipment and tools (41%), theft of livestock (40%) and theft of fuel (36%).

Many of our farmers have experienced crime more than seven times.

Crimes are usually committed by the same offenders and if not caught, they will keep offending. Reporting crime doesn't only help one farmer, it can help an entire community if the offender is caught.

Rural crimes continue to have a devastating effect on farming families, rural communities and the wider NSW community and economy.

CEO of Crime Stoppers NSW, Mr Peter Price said every farmer matters, every community matters, and every piece of information matters. If a crime has been committed against one person, it's likely this is not just one offence. Reporting your crime, might help your neighbour.

"We are seeking assistance from rural communities to report anything suspicious, anything they know and any crime, no matter how small they think it might be," said Mr Price. In smaller communities, something or someone out of place is easier to spot. Help your farmer, help your community by reporting even the smallest detail."

In the past six months a number of rural crimes have been solved thanks to a farmer reporting a crime or information received from the community. (31 Aug) Police were notified of stock theft on 23 July 2024, in the southern tablelands and the following day police found the offender and seized the stolen sheep which were returned to the owners.

(27 June) In another case, a man was charged with ten firearm and drug offences including possession of a stolen firearm and prohibited drugs. He has been refused bail and is due to appear in court later this year.

(19 June) In another case a man was charged with 13 offences including hunting on a private property without a licence and stolen firearms. NSW Police Force, Rural Crime Prevention Team, State Rural Crime Coordinator, Detective Acting Inspector Andrew Maclean said the community and police need to continue to work together and increase the reporting of rural crime.

"Working with regional communities to target rural crime is a priority for the Rural Crime Prevention Team," said Detective Acting Inspector Maclean. We would like to encourage farmers to accurately record livestock identification, remove keys from machinery, keep photos of valuable stock and install quality locking devices on farm gates, sheds and equipment. "If you see or hear of anything you believed to be suspicious, such as a vehicle in an area that's not meant to be there, or stock being moved late at night; we urge you to call Crime Stoppers or your local police."

We need to be informed; we can't do that without the public reporting crime.

When reporting a crime, police advise to leave the area as it is to be able to conduct a thorough analysis so that they are able to collect evidence to help with the investigation.

There are many different ways the community can report crime in their area including PAL, their local police station, Crime Stoppers and Triple Zero for emergencies. The campaign centres on the tagline - Be a pal and report any theft, any time, to PAL on 131 444 - and - report suspicious or actual criminal information to Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.


