BCA Meet the Candidates Event

With Council elections taking place this week, Braidwood residents were able to hear directly from candidates at the Meet the Candidates event last Thursday Sept 5th organised by the Braidwood Community Association. This was the final in a series of MTC events held throughout the QPRC local Govt area. According to the candidates, it was the best attended of these meetings, with about 50 people gathering at the Braidwood Servicemen's Club Hall.

The BCA conducted a survey to identify and prioritise some of the issues and projects the community wants the next Council to progress. John Tuckwell gave a brief presentation on the results of the survey, and candidates were asked to undertake to progress the top 6 priorities if elected to the next Council. Candidates had 5 mins to present their own priorities, as well as to comment on the BCA survey results. Almost all the candidates present agreed to support these community priorities.

A Q&A session followed, with discussion covering a range of topics. These included roads funding, council's financial position, contributions to funding from State and Federal government grants, the role of political parties in local government, affordable housing, and Council support for creative arts and cultural events.

Thanks to all the Council candidates who attended the meeting, and to the BCA Committee, Rod McClure, the Club staff, and Braidwood FM radio for ensuring the success of this event. Thanks also to the residents who attended and contributed to the discussion. The next Council will be very aware of the needs and priorities of our community, and the BCA will continue to push strongly for the issues and projects identified in our survey. The BCA's AGM will be held next Tuesday 17th September at 5.30pm at the Braidwood Servicemen's Club.

A Sneek peek from the dress rehearsal

It is the third longest running West End musical of all time, it received rave reviews and standing ovations on Broadway and it is about to hit the stage at Braidwood Central School (BCS). The Braidwood Bugle was invited to a full dress rehearsal of the musical yesterday evening and can report it is a knee slapping, singalong journey through the decades back to more innocent times.

It is set in the time before the internet and mobile phone, a time where communications were more often than not conducted by snail mail.

BCS Drama Teacher and Musical Director, Mrs Elisa James, uses this change of pace from the outset, to journey the audience through an enchanting and uplifting rom com, all set on a mythical Greek island. The dialogue is sharp, laced with innuendo and layers of irony but it is the singing which wowed this reviewer.

The BCS cast does justice to some of the most famous pop songs ever written to the point of almost tempting the audience to sing along.

It is a totally uncynical, consistently compelling and feel good tale of love conquering all. In fact, this production is perfect for anyone who says they do not like theatre or who 'doesn't do musicals'. With a high percentage of repeat audience members among the 32 million people who have seen it in 190 cities worldwide speaks volumes for its popularity.

Year 9 student, Natalie Clifton, has a lead role.

Natalie said "I have made new friends through the rehearsals and it has taught me to be adaptable to new challenges. It has certainly improved my confidence."

Student, Oliver Gurling, rates the experience as the highlight of Year 11.

Oliver said "It has really improved my organisational skills. I never imagined I would ever do something like this and now I am really enjoying the buzz as we get closer to opening night."

Year 8 and Year 9 students, Riley Long and Henry Campbell are part of the all important backstage crew.

Henry said "We are working on the lighting and audio. It is great to learn new skills and be part of a team. Opening night should be fantastic and it is all coming together at the right time."

BCS Principal, Ms Nerida Mosely, thanked the community for its support to date.

Ms Mosely said "We announced the intention to perform this musical towards the end of last year. We conducted auditions and up to sixty students have been spending most Thursdays rehearsing. Working bees have been co-ordinated to build props and modify the stage. It has been a tremendous school and community effort. Braidwood Update from QPRC

Jembaicumbene bridges replacement

Council has awarded the contract to replace three aging timber bridges to HD Civil. The single-lane bridges cross Jembaicumbene Creek on a 146m stretch of Araluen Road and are all in a degrading condition. The new bridges will be two-lane concrete crossings, upgrading the function and flood resilience of the crossing. This project is funded by \$5.1 million under the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges program.

Draft Cat Containment Policy

We are seeking feedback on a revised cat containment policy that will require all cats in Queanbeyan-Palerang to be contained to their properties from July 2026. Council first adopted a Cat Containment Policy in 2021 which applied to specific cat containment areas. This revised policy is proposed to apply to all cats in Queanbeyan-Palerang. The revised Cat Containment Policy has two stages. All cats born on or after 1 January 2025 will need to be contained from 1 January 2025. All cats, of any age, must be kept within your property from 1 July 2026. Cats in the existing cat containment areas including South Jerrabomberra, Elmslea Grove, Jumping Creek, parts of Googong and other new greenfield developments are already required to be contained. This revised policy asks owners of cats to follow similar rules to dog owners by keeping them under effective control when outside their property. Draft Solid Fuel Heater Policy

We are also seeking feedback on our Draft Solid Fuel Heater Policy. Wood-burning heaters are a major contributor to air pollution in NSW and the smoke they produce can seriously affect your health and lead to premature death. This draft policy only applies to new applications for the installation of solid fuel heaters in the urban areas of the Queanbeyan-Palerang local government area. It does not apply to existing heaters which have been installed with Council approval. It is instead for all new applications for solid fuel heaters in the urban areas of the local government area. The policy does not apply to rural areas of the LGA, existing heaters that have been installed with Council approval, or the replacement of existing approved wood heaters. The policy does not require the removal of existing wood heaters in buildings. Have your say on the draft policy until 16 October 2024 at yourvoice.qprc.nsw.gov.au/draft-solid-fuel-heater-policy

Extended Library hours for students studying for exams

One day a week, we are opening our libraries late to provide a place for students to study. Students can visit the Braidwood Library on Tuesday, the Bungendore Library on Wednesdays, and the Queanbeyan Library on Thursdays until 8pm. The extended hours end on 8 November, when the HSC exam period finishes.

Transport infrastructure assessment

We have engaged Talis Consultants to provide a comprehensive assessment of our transport infrastructure, including roads, bridges, footpaths, carparks, and drainage. Over the next couple of months, you might see cars on the road and bikes on footpaths with lasers and cameras travelling around the whole local government area, recording the condition of this infrastructure. We have an extensive transport network of nearly 1000km of sealed roads, more than 730km of unsealed roads, more than 300km of pathways, 172 vehicular bridges and 8 pedestrian bridges. The network requires regular assessment and revaluation every 4 to 5 years, so we can prepare proactive long-term plans. This project is critical to improving Council's road management and will be used to help set Council's 2025-26 and future budgets.

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Telstra upgrading 4G experience at Rossi and Harolds Cross

Telstra will be upgrading its satellite small cell mobile facility at Rossi and Harolds Cross to bring better 4G services to the area, however the works will require a series of temporary outages or reduction in mobile coverage.

At ROSSI - These improvements will temporarily impact Telstra mobile coverage for up to 8 hours during the day on Friday 13 September and Saturday 14 September 2024.

If all goes according to plan and weather permitting, residents should be noticing an improvement in Telstra mobile services by 14 September 2024.

AT HAROLDS CROSS - Telstra will be upgrading its satellite small cell mobile facility at Harolds Cross to bring better 4G services to the area, however the works will require a series of temporary outages or reduction in mobile coverage.

These improvements will temporarily impact Telstra mobile coverage for up to 8 hours during the day on Tuesday 24 September and Wednesday 25 September 2024.

If all goes according to plan and weather permitting, residents should be noticing an improvement in Telstra mobile services by 25 September 2024.

Telstra mobile customers will receive text messages advising of the upcoming work.

Landline services, NBN internet services and mobile coverage from other providers will not be impacted. Any calls to Triple Zero from a Telstra mobile when the site is off air will automatically be diverted to any working mobile network for connection to emergency services. Regional General Manager for Telstra, Chris Taylor, said while our crews need to work during daylight for safety, we'll only be switching off the site when we need to and have it back on as quickly as possible.

"There's never a good time to undertake this sort of work but once it is completed, it will mean better mobile services for local residents," Mr Taylor said.

"As a company, we heavily invest in improving regional connectivity and this site is another example of our commitment. Over the past seven years to the end of FY23, Telstra invested \$11 billion in our mobile network nationally, with \$4 billion of this invested in our regional mobile network."

Tips for improving connectivity while works are underway

For mobile coverage in the interim, if residents have access to a Wi-Fi signal at home or at work, Telstra encourages residents to activate Wi-Fi calling. This is a free setting on most popular mobile phones and allows your mobile to use a Wi-Fi network to make and receive mobile calls. To find out more they can google Telstra Wi-Fi calling or just search in your settings icon on your phone.

We know many businesses use the Telstra network for their EFTPOS terminals. However, Telstra does not operate the EFTPOS network; it is operated by financial institutions. Many EFTPOS terminals can also be connected using fixed line or Wi-Fi/NBN internet connections. Retailers should contact their bank for more information and details on how to switch between these methods to ensure continuous service.

The **Braidwood Common s355 Committee** is due for its Annual General Meeting and we extend an invitation for interested members of the Braidwood community to attend. Our AGM will be at 6.30pm on Monday 23rd September at The Glasshouse Community Centre in Park Lane (opposite the QPRC library). Come along to learn more about the Braidwood Common and how this precious natural asset is being maintained in the interests of our local community.

The Braidwood Common lies to the west of town and includes the Braidwood Community Gardens, Flood Creek footbridge, Judith Wright Gardens, the Flood Creek Nature Trail, and grazing paddocks used by the Braidwood Central School Ag Program. At last - A new site confirmed for Bungendore High School

The Minns Labor Government will build the permanent Bungendore High School on a new, larger site that will accommodate a growing population and end years of delay after the Liberals' and Nationals' poor planning let this community down.

To ensure the long-awaited new high school can be delivered as quickly as possible, the Department of Education conducted due diligence work in recent months, which considered alternative site options for the school after The Land and Environment Court overturned the previous planning approval following a challenge by a local community group.

The Court's ruling in December last year was the culmination in a series of disappointments felt by local families and followed the selection of the Majara Street site by the former government. This led to ongoing challenges to the school's approval, leaving local families without the permanent school they need and deserve. Following the Court's decision, the Department apologised for the delays caused by previous planning failures, and committed to considering alternative options. The Department's review determined that a four-hectare site on Birchfield Drive site in North Bungendore presents the most viable location for the new permanent high school.

The department has now acquired the site and has begun work on design and planning for the new school, with the aim of opening in early 2027.

The site is located in a new residential area of Bungendore which is being developed as the town expands, in line with the Queanbeyan-Palerang Regional Council's Bungendore Structure Plan 2048.

The new site is larger than the Majara Street site, including space for a full-size playing field, and the new school will be able to accommodate predicted enrolment growth.

Bungendore High School has been operational in purpose-built temporary facilities alongside Bungendore Public School since Term 1 2023. From Term 1 next year, the school will be open to students from Years 7 to 10.

The temporary high school will also expand to include classrooms within the former Council offices at the Majara Street site while the permanent school is built. Work on the design and planning for this is underway.

Once the new school is complete, the Department will engage with the local community about future uses of the Majara Street site.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Education and Early Learning Prue Car said: "Families have been rightly frustrated by the uncertainty over when their high school would be able to be built. With the securing of a new site, we will end the uncertainty and deliver a fit-for-purpose school as quickly as possible.

"Families in this area have waited too long for this much-needed new public high school, after poor planning by the former Liberal National Government caused division in the community. "This site will ensure we are able to provide the best public education and facilities for students in Bungendore well into the future."

Member for Monaro Steve Whan said: "After years of unnecessary delays, I welcome today's announcement, as we start a new chapter on this project.

"The former government's secrecy failed to meet the community's expectations, as did overly optimistic advice from the Department.

"I'm pleased the Department has moved the location of the new Bungendore High School to a site that can be delivered as quickly as possible, and that can fit additional students to cater for the growing population. "This has been a long and frustrating process for the entire community, and I thank you all for your patience while we finally get underway with building the new school.

"I look forward to welcoming students to the new school in 2027."

As part of the NSW Government's plan to rebuild public education, the 2024-25 Budget is delivering record education funding, including \$1.4 billion for new and upgraded schools in regional NSW.

This targeted investment will ensure growing communities get access to a world class public education.



Report of Royal Commission into Defence & Veteran Suicide

The NSW Government welcomes the report and recommendations handed down by the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide. The seven-volume Final Report contains 122 recommendations that were tabled in Federal Parliament on Monday.

The NSW Office for Veterans Affairs (OVA) is currently working on the next iteration of the NSW Government Veterans Strategy 2025-2030, due to be launched in 2025, and the important findings of the Royal Commission will help inform the strategy.

The Returned & Services League of Australia (RSL) is urging the Australian Government to take comprehensive and sustainable action to implement the recommendations outlined in the Final Report of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide.

Tabled in Federal Parliament today (Monday), the report marks the end of the Commission's three-year inquiry and RSL Australia extends its appreciation to the Commissioners for their work and commitment to shine a light on issues that are detrimental to the health and wellbeing of veterans, current serving Australian Defence Force (ADF) members, and their families.

RSL Australia President Greg Melick said that since the Royal Commission was established in July 2021, the Commissioners had worked tirelessly to hear from hundreds of individuals who bravely shared their personal stories, as well as reading thousands of submissions about their lived experiences.

"The RSL is indebted to every individual who shared their story and stands ready to play its part in bringing about meaningful change," Greg Melick said.

"The Final Report demonstrates how Australia has systematically failed those who have served and continue to serve our nation, and importantly, it provides a clear pathway to redress those failures," he said.

"The RSL calls on the Australian Government to accept the report and immediately commence the implementation process.

"The RSL is reiterating its call for the establishment of an independent National Commissioner for Defence and Veteran Wellbeing to lead the implementation of the recommendations made by the Royal Commission and to ensure there is a sustained and permanent watch on the health and wellbeing of veterans, ex-serving ADF members, and their families."

Greg Melick said over the past three years, the Returned & Services League had advocated that the implementation of recommendations can best be achieved through the establishment of an independent and enduring entity.

"It is critical that Government, Defence and the ex-service organisation sector – including the RSL, work together and act," Greg Melick said.

"We recognise that the RSL has a role to play, including to continue to collaborate with the wider ESO sector, but it is imperative that the Australian Government continues the momentum from its implementation of earlier interim recommendations by ensuring appropriate funding and resources are allocated to respond to the recommendations in the Royal Commission's final report.

"Around 147,000 RSL members in communities across Australia stand ready to help inform, support and deliver the Australian Government's response to recommendations of the final report.

"We can't ignore the experiences outlined in this report, that's why the RSL is committed to ensuring that veterans and their families remain at the heart of this critical work."

Proposed reforms to stamp out bad councillor behaviour and increase transparency in local government

Minister for Local Government

The NSW Government is proposing reforms to overhaul the broken Code of Conduct system for elected councillors, which is generating thousands of trivial complaints making it almost impossible to act swiftly and fairly on matters of genuine concern. A discussion paper released today proposes a complete rewrite and simplification of the Model Code of Conduct as well as a number of new pathways for addressing poor councillor behaviour.

At over 100 pages long the current code of conduct framework is overly complex, distracts from robust democratic debate and is being increasingly weaponised for political reasons.

There were 4,289 code of conduct complaints lodged over the last three years alone, forcing councils to divert significant time and money from providing local services to resolve these complaints.

Proposed reforms would streamline the code of conduct down to 2-3 pages similar to the State Parliamentary code, and outline clear expectations of behaviour for 1,300 elected councillors.

The new code of conduct system would see minor complaints about councillor misbehaviour dealt with by a councillor's peers and leave serious matters relating to conflicts of interest to be examined by the Office of Local Government.

The government is also putting forward reforms to improve transparency of council meetings to ensure decisions are being made openly and in the best interests of the community as a whole.

Key reforms outlined in the discussion paper, some of which would require changes to the Local Government Act 1993, include:

- Establishing a local government privileges committee of experienced councillors with mayoral experience to assess complaints made against councillors for misbehaviour, consistent with practices in other tiers of government (where the conduct does not meet the threshold for police or referral to another investigative body or tribunal)
- Removing private investigators from the councillor conduct process, while strengthening the investigative capability of the Office of Local Government to investigate and prosecute legitimate complaints (such as issuing penalty infringement notices where conflict of interest declarations have not been made)
- Banning private councillor briefing sessions, except in very limited circumstances
- Strengthening lobbying guidelines for local government
- Giving mayors more power to expel councillors from meetings for acts of disorder and remove their entitlement to receive a fee in the month of their indiscretion

Minister for Local Government Ron Hoenig said:

"The current councillor code of conduct system is fundamentally broken.

"It is too open to weaponisation, with tit-for-tat complaints diverting critical council resources and ratepayer money from the things that matter most to communities.

"The sheer volume of vexatious complaints being made is preventing the Office of Local Government from focussing its attention on getting crooks out of the local government sector.

"The options presented in this discussion paper put the onus back on addressing and resolving issues of councillor misbehaviour at a local level, rather than escalating complaints for the state government or private investigators to fix.

"It also puts forward options to strengthen the role of the Office of Local Government as the sector regulator, including expanded investigation powers for serious conflict of interest breaches and the ability to issue penalty infringement notices.

"For far too long the system has been abused. It's time to restore public confidence in councils and ensure the dignity of this vital third tier of government is upheld."

The discussion paper is now open for community and sector feedback.

Submissions close Friday, 15 November 2024.

Protecting Eden-Monaro in disasters: Funding for Resilience and Preparedness

It's Tomato Planting Time

It's that time of year again. Yes, Spring is very early by all the indicators. Folks use to tell me it's just a 'False Spring'. Lately with all my efforts to get folks to pay attention to Mother Nature, and not rely on a calendar date, the term has hardened into a 'Fools Spring'. But I'm not fooled or discouraged. Each year we strive to reduce the striking temp of our seeds to get growing sooner. If your soil temp is 15C or above its Tomato planting time.

Earliest Yet

It's the earliest Spring in my memory. The soil temp in my garden is telling me it's time to plant Tomato seedlings. 15C+, it's never been ready in August before. And it's not just in my garden.

Reports are arriving from our growing Tribe, testing their soil temp to discover that it is indeed Tomato planting time. Some discovering they are almost ready for Pumpkins. With soil thermometer in hand, some gardeners have discovered that their garden microclimate is still in winter with soil temps of only 10C. It might be time to move those gardens.

Garden Preps

I don't have all my garden beds prepared so I'm up against it. There is never enough time in a day or enough hands. I've already planted out some Tomatoes in prepared beds, and this week the rest went into new beds. Some planted under Broccoli, some under Snowpeas and some out in the open. Traditionalists have done their best to perpetuate the lore and setting fear into novice gardeners and those new to the region. But the times they are a changing and the word is getting out. You may be thinking it's too early and where would I get a Tomato seedling at this time of year. Never fear, BST knew Spring was coming early, so our Tomato seedlings have been available at our stockists for the past few weeks and those in the know took full advantage of it. And now Greenhouse Tomatoes will start to fill shops, nurseries, and markets, so don't be caught out, look for our wooden labels.

Fear No Frost

After growing in the highlands for long enough, I'm not worried about light frosts damaging my Tomatoes. Any frost now, will only be brief. Last year the seedlings took quite a few frosts after planting them out. This year there has been minimal frost to mention, so our little treasures haven't really been tested.

If your Tomatoes seedlings are from a green house, and every offering on the commercial market is, your seedlings probably won't like the cold nights or surprise frosts, they'll need to be babied and hardened off by you, delaying planting. Our Unpredictable Highland Climate deals wild weather in most seasons, and recent years have been anything but normal. So, how do you know when it's tomato planting time?

When, When, When

It's not a calendar date, it's actually before Tomato Cup Day. This Arbitrary date is an urban approximation to remind gardeners to pay attention. What is important is the data collected against this memorable date, to see how far Spring is off. The original essence has been diluted over time. Clinging fearfully to the adage isn't helping anyone to eat Tomatoes at Christmas. The Tomato Cup Day rule is a very helpful one, if understood and applied correctly. The only true way to know when to plant Summer veggies is to monitor your soil temp, otherwise it's just guess work and luck. With our short growing seasons, it's super important to get your timing right or go hungry.

Tomato Cup Day

The person who coined the Tomato Cup Day phrase is probably turning in their grave at how their helpful idea, from over half a century ago, has ended up as misinformation. Chinese whispers shared by novices and non gardeners, in an attempt to assist each other and sound informed. Let us right the ship, stop fearing the frost and collect some data against that calendar date in our own gardens.

My interpretation of the old adage is "Make sure your Tomatoes seedlings are in the ground by Tomato Cup Day".

If the soil temp is 10C and its 10weeks before Tomato Cup Day, what does that mean? Spring is probably coming on time.

If the soil temp is 15C and its 10weeks before Tomato Cup Day, what does that mean? Spring is super early and so it is again this year.

Monitoring Soil Temp has guided me to plant Tomatoes between Fathers Day and the October long weekend for the past 10 years. Last year we ate Tomatoes in the first week of December, the earliest ever. This year the soil temp was ready in August for the first time. This has been the timing in many gardens I've been involved with at altitude. Plant any later and you'll likely become the local green chutney champion.

Counting The Days

Most Tomatoes take between 90-120 days to produce ripe fruit. Know your varieties, do the maths. Waiting for frost to pass is wishful thinking at best. There is likely to be a frost or two after Tomato Cup Day, as happens every other year and sometimes we get hail. Will you wait to plant, while we all eat Tomatoes? Before we are prepared to release them for sale, we lose a lot of seedlings in testing, but in the past 10 years I haven't lost many plants to the frost in my garden. Only the strong survive and we collect the seed.

I've had some slow growth, but I wasn't discouraged, I carried on, and I learnt a lot about Tomatoes by experimenting. The soil temp is far more important than air temps. The root zone is where the magic happens, if the temp is correct, it'll grow, so mulch it.

Safety First

If the almighty weatherbots forecast 3C or below overnight, I place a cardboard box over the tiny seedling to protect from what may come. It is much easier and effective to do at this time of year, than trying to protect a fully laden bush at the end of the season.

Slow grown Tomatoes (no greenhouse) will survive a whole lot better than greenhouse Tomatoes and perform better in lower Spring temperatures.

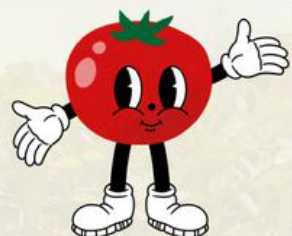
Your Spring gardening life can be easier, less stressful, and more productive, sooner if you monitor one thing.

I have been musing on what Christ means by 'whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it' (Mark 8.27-38). All through the gospels there are myriad examples that show that Christ in his life, in his words and actions, was always guided by the Spirit (and not by dogma, the letter of the law). 'My life' can mean: my attainments, my social status, my identity as in, for me for example, I am a successful senior artist. And 'lose' can mean 'let go' or 'forget.' I feel that Christ is telling me that in order to be saved I must 'let go', not be guided by my attainments, my social status, my identity, rather let the Spirit guide me.

Two great poets from opposite sides of the planet and separated by centuries of time offer two pithy suggestions of what this sense of 'losing one's life' can mean in practice. The Japanese poet Basho (1644 – 1694) advised his young followers: 'Do not follow in the footsteps of the great, follow what they saw.' And when a young man told T. S. Elliot (1888 – 1965) that he wanted to be a Poet, T. S. Elliot responded: 'there is poetry, but there are no poets.'

The Cost of Love

Robyn and I embraced parenthood. It didn't happen easily for us but our desire to have children was strong. We were young and it felt like everyone seemed to have babies without any struggle. Why was it such a struggle for us? Perhaps I thought parenthood would bring the best out of me – turn me into a nice man. When it eventually happened, someone gave us this little package that leaked profusely from both ends. We kissed goodbye to the thought of sleep. Our little package kept his own timetable, and he was noisy happy or noisy sad but always noisy.

We were married as teenagers. I'm sure we thought we had just embarked on a journey of 60 years of bliss. We loved each other, what could possibly go wrong. My wage in those days was \$22 pw before tax and Robyn left her job to marry me. After we paid rent, there was barely enough for food so any thought of buying clothes was never entertained. My taste for study and my various career choices kept us broke. Before credit cards existed, we just did without things. After credit cards appeared, we'd buy things like school shoes and be paying for them years after they had been thrown out. I was brought up in a home that displayed love and annoyance. It was busy, at times, chaotic. There were always outsiders at our house who would arrive without notice. Robyn was raised in a quiet, ordered home where any displays of anything much were discouraged. Our love was strong and remains strong even though we were destined to be each something of a shock (on a bad day) and puzzle (on a good day) for each other.

What is love without cost? Surely a fantasy of some sort, perhaps, entertainment. Love that is convenient is highly suspicious. If love is convenient too long, someone has disappeared, and the activity is no longer between two. But the endless negotiation, endless learning, joy and sadness of real love fill the world with meaning not in a way that gives answers but in a way that makes the questions disappear. We had two kids whom we love with all our hearts. They kept us broke, but we'd shun any possibility of riches if we had to live a life without them. One of our kids died and the cost of that loss is a daily presence. Our love for each other has grown, not because I've conned this poor girl but because with eyes wide open and fully awake through the worst of trauma, love has deepened. The sadness brought reality. The real is better than the fantasy.

The text that each of the churches ponder this week is the most mind-blowing words of Jesus about embracing the cost of love. Love sets impossibly high goals and comes at unbearable cost. It's the way of the cross. Love free but expensive gives purpose and meaning a mystery not known by all religious but known by all who love. grahamlong@mac.com

The Gadflies play Braidwood

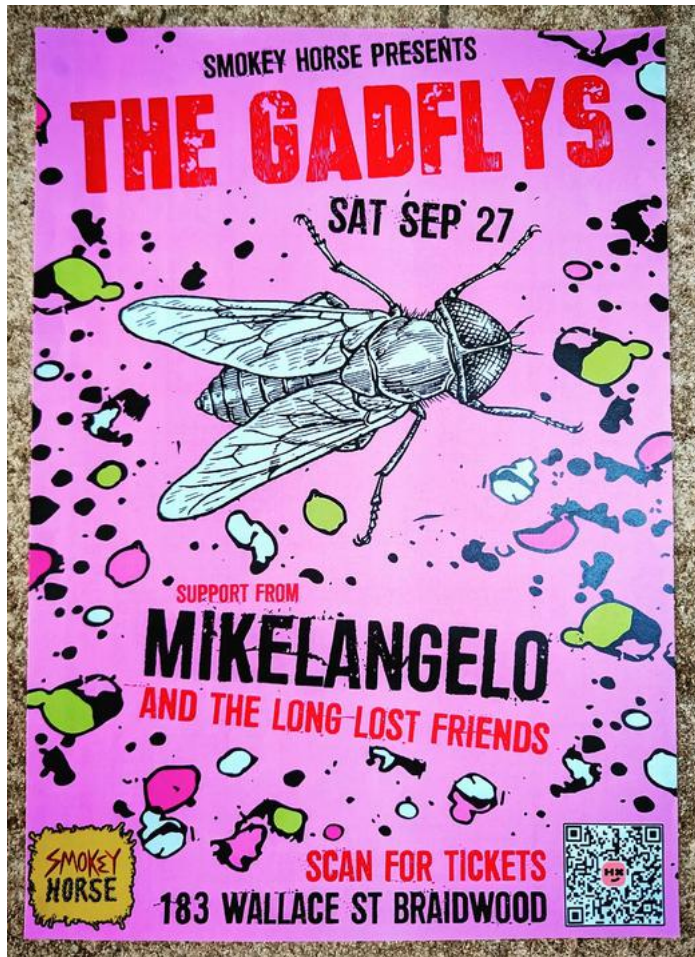

1980s Canberra, 'a dysfunctional, socialist utopia.'

Politicians, public sculpture and no culture. Home to the gadflies, a group who emerged amidst the unlikely yet burgeoning Canberra punk scene, they soon transcended the strictures of punk and '80s synth pop to develop a unique style. Opting to play acoustic instruments – classical guitar, clarinet and double bass – their sound became less abrasive and more melodic though they still retained the urgency and energy of punk.

Founding members Phil and Mick Moriarty's dad played clarinet in a band called Clean Living Clive's Good Time Palace Orchestra. He had a record of Benny Goodman performing "Sing Sing Sing" at Carnegie Hall, with Gene Krupa's drums pounding away like a runaway freight train, a big influence on the boys. The brothers developed an enthusiasm for the tambourine rhythms and melodic thrills of '60s Motown. They both admired the straight-shooting singing styles of Iggy Pop and Shane McGowan. Mick coined the term Mongrel Jazz to describe the blend of blues, klezmer, skiffle and cool jazz, underpinned by righteously rootsy grooves, which formed the Gadflies sound over four albums two EPs.

After 15 years of constant touring and gigging, the Gadflies' fortunes were boosted courtesy of a three-year stint on Paul McDermott's satirical TV panel show Good News Week. Playing original tunes live to camera, they soon won over a legion of new fans. The GNW gig showcased the instrumental verve of musicians at the top of their game. The band also backed well-known artists Neil Finn, Steve Harley, Glen Tilbrook, Diesel and Yothu Yindi. The Gadflies will be performing two sets at Smokey Horse, with support from local legends Mikelangelo and the Long Lost Friends.

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Climate change report highlights challenges for agriculture in reaching net zero

The release of the Climate Change Authority Sector Pathways (CCASP) report today provides a timely reflection on the challenges facing the agriculture sector in Australia's transition to net zero.

National Farmers' Federation President David Jochinke welcomed the report as a balanced and detailed document that reinforces the realities previously highlighted by the sector: net zero emissions by 2050 is not achievable for Australian agriculture under current conditions.

"The report adopts a multi-scenario approach, including analyses from the CSIRO, and makes clear that none of the scenarios achieve net zero for agriculture by 2050.

"The most ambitious of these, which factors in 5 million hectares of vegetative offsets, raises significant concerns.

"Achieving offsets through land reallocation on this scale would have a profound and detrimental impact on food and fibre production."

The report aligns with these concerns, acknowledging that climate change is likely to increase competition for suitable land, and underlines the importance of safeguarding food and fibre security.

It also highlights the ongoing need for technological advancements to help the sector decarbonise, outlining a range of innovations that need to be progressed to enable a reduction in emissions from the agriculture sector, including:

- Feed supplements;
- Slow-release or nitrification-inhibiting coated fertilisers;
- Improved herd and pasture management;
- Manure management; and
- Renewable or electric vehicles and machinery.

"Farmers are already doing the hard yards in these areas, but there's still a lot of work to do to make sure these innovations are affordable and effective."

However, the report recognises that the widespread adoption of these technologies is not expected until after 2035.

Mr Jochinke said one element of concern in the report was the suggestion of changing dietary preferences away from red meat.

"The NFF strongly opposes this notion, maintaining that a balanced and nutritious diet includes red meat.

"The idea that alternative animal proteins could replace red meat in Australia's unique rangelands is severely misguided."

The report also identifies several significant barriers that must be addressed if Australia is to successfully transition to net zero. It highlights the following:

- Slow and complicated development approval processes for renewable energy infrastructure;
- A lack of community support for key clean energy projects, such as wind and solar infrastructure and transmission lines;
- Supply chain constraints for low-emission technologies;
- The cost of low and zero-emissions technologies;
- Workforce shortages in regional areas and in new industries;
- Gaps in data that hinder effective planning for decarbonisation and investment decisions.

"Agriculture faces substantial challenges in meeting infrastructure demands, particularly for renewable energy and new transmission lines," Mr Jochinke explained.

"The report rightly acknowledges that maintaining 'social licence' is critical for the success of these projects. This should be a wake-up call for project proponents to engage early and meaningfully with regional communities."

"This report aligns with the views expressed by Ministers Watt and Bowen during the Sustainable Agriculture Summit – agriculture cannot be the solution for other sectors' emissions through offsetting.

"Innovation, respect for land use, and careful planning will be key in ensuring agriculture can continue to thrive in Australia's net zero future."

State's pest problem explodes

Funding to fight off biosecurity threats must continue to be a top priority, **NSW Farmers warns**, as a new report exposes the true cost of the state's ballooning pests and weeds problem. The Invasive Species Management Review released by the NSW Government this week found the cost of invasive species in NSW skyrocketed to \$1.9 billion in the 2022-23 financial year.

NSW Farmers Conservation and Resource Management Committee Member Bronwyn Petrie said as the state's pests and weeds continued to explode, a coordinated and concerted effort to ramp up biosecurity had never been more critical.

"There's no doubt we have a problem; pigs the size of footy players are running rampant across the state, weeds are spreading like wildfire and wild dogs are bleeding through our borders," Mrs Petrie said. "The state government has made a strong start when it comes to supporting us in this battle against invasive species, but we're at a point now where the problem is spiraling out of control."

"In the blink of an eye, we have gone from a multi-million-dollar dilemma to a multi-billion-dollar one, and farmers can only spend so much more of their own time and money trying to control these species before they can no longer front up to produce our food and fibre."

With the report projecting new biosecurity incursions could cost the state \$29.7 billion annually by 2030, Mrs Petrie said significant steps must be taken to bolster the nation's biosecurity systems before the problem escalated too far out of control.

"There's no doubt we need a cross-tenure, cross-landscape approach to managing weeds and pests that's more intensive and enforceable than anything we currently have in place," Mrs Petrie said.

"Pests and weeds are the problem of all land managers – not just farmers – and our plan to tackle them needs to recognise this shared responsibility, if we are to shift the dial."

"Real action, plans and progress on protecting our state from these threats needs to be put in place now, or else a few years down the track we could well lose this battle on biosecurity."

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Methane emissions increase by 20 per cent in 20 years

The Global Methane Budget 2024, released this week highlights methane emissions from human activities have increased by 20 per cent in the past two decades.

Methane is one of three core greenhouse gases that contribute to climate change. It lasts in the atmosphere for just a few decades, which is shorter when compared to its counterparts, carbon dioxide and nitrous oxide. Methane has the highest short-term global warming potential as it holds more heat in the atmosphere.

The budget is produced by international research partners, including CSIRO, Australia's national science agency, as part of the Global Carbon Project. It covers 17 natural and anthropogenic (human-induced) sources and shows that methane has increased by 61 million metric tonnes per year. Pep Canadell, CSIRO's Executive Director for the Global Carbon Project, said methane concentrations have recently risen faster than ever, since reliable measurements began in 1986.

"We have seen higher growth rates for methane over the past three years, from 2020-2022, with a record high in 2021. This increase means methane concentrations in the atmosphere are 2.6 times higher than its pre-industrial (1750) levels," Dr Canadell said.

"Human activities are responsible for at least two-thirds of global methane emissions, adding about 0.5°C to global warming that has occurred to date."

The report found agriculture contributes 40 per cent of global methane emissions from human activities. This is followed by the fossil fuel sector (34 per cent), solid waste and wastewater (19 per cent), and biomass and biofuel burning (7 per cent).

The top five country emitters of anthropogenic methane in 2020 were China (16 per cent), India (9 per cent), USA (7 per cent), Brazil (6 per cent), and Russia (5 per cent).

The European Union and Australasia have successfully reduced their anthropogenic methane emissions over the past two decades. However, if the trend of anthropogenic methane emissions continues to increase globally, this would jeopardise the success of the Global Methane Pledge, an international commitment to reduce methane emissions by 30 per cent by 2030.

"Methane is a short-lived greenhouse gas compared to carbon dioxide. Most emissions, and therefore their warming effect in the atmosphere, occur during the first 20 years after being released, so it's a good target for fast mitigation of global warming," Dr Canadell said.

"For net-zero emission pathways consistent with the Paris Agreement, which is stabilising temperatures below 2°C from pre-industrial levels, anthropogenic methane emissions need to decline by 45 per cent by 2050, relative to 2019 levels."

Addressing methane emissions from the agriculture sector include improved land management practices, such as improving the efficiency of animal production, provision of feed additives that reduce enteric methane, and breeding animals that produce less methane.

Dr Michael Battaglia, CSIRO's Towards Net Zero Lead, said CSIRO is working on a range of research and innovation to support sustainability goals to reduce methane emissions.

"Mitigation efforts include developing FutureFeed, with partners Meat & Livestock Australia and James Cook University, an Asparagopsis seaweed-based feed additive to significantly reduce enteric methane emissions in livestock. This is one of an array of feed supplements in a suite of technologies to address ruminant methane," said Dr Battaglia.

"We're also researching how legumes may be used to reduce methane in grazing livestock."

South Coast Mountain Bike Network expands with first 70 kilometres of Mogo Trails unveiled



The NSW South Coast is fast becoming the go-to mountain bike destination with the first 70 kilometres of the Mogo Trails project having recently opened.

Eurobodalla Shire Council was awarded \$5 million for the Mogo Trails project, through the jointly funded Australian and NSW Government's Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund.

Combined with trails at Narooma, Tathra and Eden; a whole-of-region mountain bike attraction is expected draw 65,000 new visitors to the South Coast each year.

The impacts of the devastating 2019/20 Black Summer Bushfire still being felt. These trails will bring much-needed visitors and investment, helping to boost the local economy.

The eastern section of the trails will cater to riders of all abilities, from beginner white trails to advanced double black runs for thrill-seekers, with the entire Mogo Trails network expected to be open by early 2025. Federal Minister for Emergency Management Jenny McAllister said "We want to find ways to support local jobs and bring more visitors into the region after the devastating impact of the bushfires.

"The new Mogo trails will help promote the local economy and ensure landscapes in the South Coast region are easier to access and enjoy. With options for beginners to advanced riders, there are more reasons than ever to visit the beautiful South Coast.

"Recovery isn't just about rebuilding homes and infrastructure it's also about delivering projects that support communities to get back to what is important - connection, lifestyle and community."
